The Greatest is Love

When I was younger I used to have to see a speech therapist. I struggled with pronunciation (some would argue I still do). I'd hear words incorrectly and then speak them incorrectly. In addition to this - if I couldn't say a word I'd just substitute it - for years, my friend Matthew was a 'Schwepshwep'! Well into my teens I would say words incorrectly until someone would kindly inform me of the correct version. I remember a secondary school teacher asking me what the word 'safternoon' meant in my exercise book. When I explained that it followed the morning, he looked at me gone out and said, 'You mean 'this afternoon'?' A lightbulb moment - I had heard it as 'safternoon', always said it as 'safternoon' had therefore written it as 'safternoon' and no one had ever picked me up on it! As you're probably gathering - I wan't the brightest! One of my favourite songs from my childhood was 'Love Reign O'er Me' by The Who. But it wasn't until years later that I realised that it was 'Reign' - I'd always thought it was 'Rain'. 'Love Rain on me' is what I'd been hearing.

Why have I even been thinking about this and why am I sharing this with you now? Well it's because I've been thinking about Dave - I'm missing him if I'm honest. Prior to Dave's accident we would spend all day, everyday together - in the office, in meetings or driving around in his or my car on the way to or from meetings. I've been thinking about one particular day whilst driving to a meeting. Dave was showing me a fancy new gadget in his car, linked to the stereo. Basically, you spoke into the gadget requesting a song and it would play the song. 'Any song?' I asked.

'Any,' Dave replied.

'Any song in the whole wide world?'

'Any,' said Dave with confidence. I was determined that I could come up with a song that was not in its repertoire.

'This is not a Love Song, by Pill' I said, and sure enough it began to play.

'Cream for Crow, by Captain Beefheart.' Once again it began to play.

This went on with me pulling up random, unheard of songs from my youth. It wasn't long before I was dredging up the rude and vulgar songs that I recalled from some distant past. And with my mind well and truly in the gutter by this point, I announced the next track. To my horror I recognised the intro - the baseline, followed by rhythm and electric guitars. I panicked -

'Dave, how do I stop it. How do I stop it?'

The lead singer's voice began....'Dave, how do I stop it - quick'

Dave replied, 'Just say another song.'

'Errrrmmmm....Love Reign O'er Me - The Who'

Phew! Where did I pull that one from as my get out of jail card? - and believe me, I knew what was coming so it really was a get out of jail card!

'Love Reign O'er Me' by The Who. Love **Reign** O'er Me - **Reign**: to rule, to prevail, to hold sway, to be a force, to endure, to survive, to save. I don't think it was any coincidence that I pulled that cat out of the bag to save me at that point.

I'd not listened to that song in years, but since that car journey I've listened to it over and over. Since Dave's accident it has become even more poignant as I have been reflecting on everything we've been building over the last 5 years - everything we've been striving to achieve. Love to reign over everything is what we strive for - to reign over our schools, to reign over our decision making and our choices - to make sure those decisions are made for the right reasons.

1 Corinthians 13 tells us that if we have no love then we have nothing. I totally agree. Can you imagine a school with no love? It goes on to tell us what love is: patient, and kind. It tells us what love isn't: rude, arrogant, irritable, resentful, doesn't boast or envy. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. We're told it is greater than hope and greater than faith and we're told it never ends.

Some people, I fear, would rubbish this as ideology or a fairy tale at best, yet I see it as simplistic as the title of the song. Let love 'Reign' over us and we will make the right decisions, appoint the right people, embed the right ethos, share the right vision and values, disseminate the best practice and we'll do it all for the right reasons. And like when someone smiles at you and you can't help but smile back, it becomes infectious, which is why we have staff across our schools going out of their way to help each other. Headteachers who sit on each other's Governing Bodies, schools that are more than willing to loan out one of their best members of staff to go and problem solve in another school and, more often than not, don't want any recompense for it. 'It all comes back round,' one Head said to me.

Sometimes it's tough love - the messages aren't easy that we have to deliver but by reminding ourselves of why we are doing what we are doing - and that is ultimately for the children within our schools - it makes it a little easier.

If we, from this Board of Education, through to our Local Governing Bodies, our Headteachers and all their children and staff - if we can ensure that in our schools we foster a culture whereby everything is driven by the power of love - a love that never runs out, no matter how trying the tasks in front of us become - if we can achieve that, then I believer our children will be in the perfect environment to flourish in all aspects so that they receive life in all its fullness.

Hope, faith and love and the greatest of these is love - and to think I thought it was raining!
