REVISING THE ELECTORAL ROLL:

The Church Electoral Roll is the foundation for all Church governance. It contains the names & addresses of everyone who can vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). It is revised every year, and every six years a new Electoral Roll must be prepared (including in 2019).

The Church of England Parish Resources website has guidance information and all of the forms you will need: https://www.parishresources.org.uk/pccs/apcms/.

Action	When it needs to happen
Put up the notice of the revision of the Roll	At least 14 days before the start of revision
Undertake the revision	A fixed date 15 to 28 days before the APCM
Display the revised Roll with a list of the names that have been removed	At least 14 days before the APCM
APCM	By 30 th April

You will need to plan the dates for this new Electoral Roll to fit with your APCM.

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETINGS:

These will be taking place in parishes over the coming months: please make sure you inform Church House of the results – not only of your PCC and its officers, but also your Deanery Synod Representatives. This is vital, so that the right people can be kept informed of the meetings and events and so on which are relevant to them.

There are forms which should be used for both the electoral roll and for those wishing to stand as members of PCC, deanery synod or as church wardens on the Church of England Parish Resources website. Candidates need to fill in a declaration that they are a 'fit and proper person' in respect of financial requirements as trustees under the rules of the Charity Commission. This also applies to fees officers and gift aid secretaries if they are not PCC members. The declaration will also require a statement that the candidate is not barred under the DBS safeguarding rules. Upon appointment all PCC members should undertake a DBS check if they do not already have one.

GIFT AID UPDATE

The House of Commons Library has published a briefing paper on Gift Aid. The note gives some background to the scheme and the changes that have been made to it since it was introduced. It includes notice of an increase in the individual donation limit in the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme from £20 to £30 at an annual Exchequer cost of £5m. Statutory provision to set the


RESOURCES FOR NEW PCC MEMBERS AND CHURCHWARDENS

We do not have a brochure that is specifically for PCC members, but we go through the role of the PCC and also hand out resources lists at the first session of church warden and officer training, which takes place in every Deanery round the time of the Archdeacons' visitations. The date and venue for the Derby City Deanery course is on Monday 16th September at St Peter's, Chellaston, although people are welcome to attend any of the sessions. The next one is on May 9, at Emmanuel, Swadlincote.

IMPORTANT – COPYRIGHT: DON'T FALL FOUL OF THE LAW



Just because it's on the web, it doesn't mean you can use it! Whenever you produce material for the Diocese, your parish, church, group or organisation, you need to be aware of copyright law and best practice.

This applies to both printed material (posters, magazines, leaflets etc) and digital work (websites, e-newsletters, social media, including video and audio).

The definition of copyright is:

the exclusive and assignable legal right, given to the originator for a fixed number of years, to print, publish, perform, film, or record literary, artistic, or musical material.

It is there to protect artists and their work and sets out the rights of the owner, as well as the responsibilities of other people who want to use the work.

The easiest way of understanding this is: in order to use anyone else's work, you need their permission! If you don't have their permission, you are in danger of breaching copyright law. And if you use someone else's work, they are entitled to be paid for it. If you don't have permission to use copyrighted material, the artist is perfectly entitled to send you a bill for however much they want!

The Diocese of Derby website has more details about copyright and the use of images (including the popular church cartoons) and details of websites that have free-to-use images. We encourage you review the information and learn more, especially if you are responsible for producing parish magazines, posters or maintaining websites / social media accounts.

DERBY CITY DEANERY: ROOTED IN PRAYER

PRAYING FOR PEOPLE, AND GDPR

'Can we still mention people by name when praying?'

The answer is yes - you can still pray for people!

However, you should be sensitive as to who you share prayer requests with. This isn't just because of GDPR, but should always be the case, as not everyone wants others to know certain prayer requests or needs. Some people may have situations such as health issues where they want this to be kept confidential and do not want the wider church to know.

Many churches have prayer lists either printed, or sent via email to members of the church, so our advice is:

- If you put a prayer request in the public domain make sure the person who is being prayed for is happy for this to be shared.
- If someone is asking for prayer for someone else, then do not include their full details in any published communication. It could just be their first name and what the prayer need is. God knows who you are praying for!
- If it is appropriate, then when visiting someone who is sick ask if they would be happy to be included on the prayer chain/ newsletter/ list.

'Can we read out the names of the unwell, bereaved or those who have died in our Intercessions during services?'

Praying for others is a part of our tradition and something we can offer to support anybody in difficult times. But in order to pray for somebody in public it is not necessary to reveal specific information or even their name; and if possible, we should ask them if they would like for us to offer Intercessions on their behalf. This may not be practical, of course, so we should be sensitive to acting in their best interests before offering a public prayer – and anybody uncertain should ask the Incumbent or a Church Warden.

HOLY WEEK RETREAT AT ST WERBURGH'S, SPONDON: Fr Julian Hollywell

A retreat is virtually impossible for most people with families and commitments and very often the cost rules it out. This retreat fits around your life and is totally free!

Commencing on Palm Sunday afternoon and finishing on Holy Saturday afternoon (the Saturday of Easter Weekend), a group of pilgrims will journey though Holy Week together. The dates mean it's possible for all the participants to return to celebrate Easter Day with their home churches. We meet in the round to pray together, to celebrate the Eucharist together, and there is individual input as well as talk each evening – it's an opportunity to journey into God. (see item on p15)

It's a chance to focus on yourself and God a bit, or you might want to do it because you simply want the fellowship and prayerfulness the group offers. You'll also be assigned a retreat guide with whom you can meet one to one to pray, discuss, discern together in total confidentiality.

PRAYER COURSE 2019



Detail from the icon panels at the shrine of Our Lady of the Mountain, Anjara, Jordan. According to tradition, Jesus and his mother Mary passed through the town and rested in a cave in the Ajloun Mountains near the parish, which is situated in the hills of Gilead, east of the Jordan Valley.

The Shrine of Our Lady of the Mountain not only serves as a place of pilgrimage and devotion, but also as a place of refuge and hope that continues to demonstrate faith by both words and deeds. While surrounding countries continue to commit atrocities in the name of God, causing suffering for thousands of people in the Middle East, the Shrine members are helping many people in nearby refuges, whether Christian or Muslim, who are escaping the atrocities over the border in Syria and Iraq. The Shrine also houses a school and orphanage for local children who have either lost their parents or abandoned there due to poverty.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND ABUSE

Women's Aid (<u>https://www.womensaid.org.uk/information-support/what-is-domestic-abuse/</u>) defines domestic abuse as an incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive, threatening, degrading and violent behaviour, including sexual violence, in the majority of cases by a partner or ex-partner, but also by a family member or carer. It is very common. In the vast majority of cases it is experienced by women and is perpetrated by men. Domestic abuse can include, but is not limited to, the following:

- Coercive control (a pattern of intimidation, degradation, isolation and control with the use or threat of physical or sexual violence)
- Psychological and/or emotional abuse
- Physical or sexual abuse
- Financial abuse
- Harassment and stalking
- Online or digital abuse

Domestic abuse exists as part of violence against women and girls; which also includes different forms of family violence such as forced marriage, female genital mutilation and so called "honour crimes" that are perpetrated primarily by family members, often with multiple perpetrators.

The Office for National Statistics has published updated statistics which look at how domestic abuse is dealt with at a local level within England and Wales. Key findings show, nationally:

- The police recorded 599,549 domestic abuse-related crimes in the year ending March 2018. This was an increase of 23% from the previous year.
- The police made 225,714 arrests for domestic abuse-related offences (in the 39 police forces that could supply adequate data). This equates to 38 arrests per 100 domestic abuse-related crimes recorded.
- The percentage of convictions secured for domestic abuse-related prosecutions is at its highest level since the year ending March 2010. In the year ending March 2018, 76% of prosecutions resulted in a conviction.

Figures provided for the Derbyshire Police Force area show:

- There were 18,196 domestic abuse-related incidents and crimes were recorded in the year ending March 2018. This was equivalent to 17 incidents and crimes for every 1,000 people in the population.
- There were 6,259 domestic abuse related crimes recorded in the year ending March 2018. This was equivalent to 6 crimes for every 1,000 people in the population.
- 34% of domestic abuse-related incidents and crimes were subsequently recorded as crimes in Derbyshire in the year ending March 2018.
- 50% of domestic abuse-related incidents and crimes were subsequently recorded as crimes in England and Wales in the year ending March 2018.
- 11% of all recorded crimes were classified as domestic abuse-related in Derbyshire in the year ending March 2018.
- 12% of all recorded crimes were classified as domestic abuse-related in England and Wales in the year ending March 2018.

Two further aspects to be aware of:

- It is now more common that agencies victims are signposted to do not offer single sex provision. That makes significant issues for Women's Aid.
- Universal Credit: 6 working age benefits are now rolled into one, which includes Child Benefit which previously always went to Mum or a female carer, and was often a vital bit of income where domestic abuse included financial abuse.

SHOULDER TO SHOULDER

In 2018 a bunch of blokes just like you helped a load of people by doing practical jobs they just couldn't manage by themselves. Together we completed 18 jobs, providing over 750 hours of manual and skilled labour for people



in Derby. All in all, it was a lot of hard work, but so good for the soul; cleaning, fixing, clearing, burning, chopping, painting, building, plumbing, making a real difference to someone else's life.


