

From the Deanery Administrator, Jo Simister

Dear Friends

When I was a child I was given an item called a Knitting Nancy. It consisted of an elongated wooden cotton reel with four small nails knocked into one end, arranged in a square. By continuously looping wool over the nails in sequence a long thin knitted sausage was



formed, which emerged from the other end. I am not sure I ever saw the sausage be made into anything useful.

I am not sure why this image came into my mind one day when I was thinking about life being a spiral. We never quite leave stuff behind completely but we go round and round building on the previous layer in ways we hope are positive, but which can be very destructive.. I suppose delving into the layers is a kind of personal archaeology. As we mature we understand more about the meanings and causes and value of people and experiences gone before.

Autumn, All Hallows and All Souls, and Remembrance Sunday seem to be an opportunity for collective honouring of people who have been precious to us, and I believe that part of that honouring needs to be reflected in our present, and in the decisions we make in our daily lives and in how we approach those decisions.

Our deanery life will be full of changes and chances in the coming months, as we elect new synod representatives for both Deanery and General Synods, and implement several church plants. We have the challenge of a number of vacancies at both local and diocesan levels and I am sure you will join me in appreciation of all those who are doubling up on their responsibilities at present, in the hope that new appointments will start to be made soon.

And in our national life we also have choices to make, with the unsettling prospect of having to depart from our established opinions and allegiances in order to promote a more just society. Just as in the letting go of the people and stuff that have filled our lives for a while, so I pray for a collective searching of hearts in the coming weeks, so that the knitted sausage that emerges in our collective decision making can be built into something worthwhile!

SAFEGUARDING TRAINING

The Safeguarding team are beginning to organise the Safeguarding training for 2020 and need to know where best to locate courses in the Deaneries in 2020. The face to face training courses which will be offered are Safeguarding Foundation; Safeguarding Leadership and Responding to Domestic Abuse. Opposite is a matrix which shows who in the parish require which training.

In Derby City Deanery we need to move quickly on booking the courses for the first half of the year as we have little time to arrange venues and advertise, as our allocated dates are very soon: 6-25 January 2020. (The next dates will be 13 Jul - 1 Aug.)

COVER DURING THE VACANCY OF AREA DEAN

We have been working out how to share out some of the Area Dean tasks, and a list of responsibilities and contact points will be circulated with this newsletter.

GDPR FORMS, AND THE DIOCESAN DATABASE:

Sian Kellogg at Church House is making great efforts to sort out anomalies in the Contact Management System which all diocesan officers use to contact deanery synod reps, church wardens, and so on. Please bear with us if we keep asking for confirmation of your parish officers and representatives, as we are particularly anxious to obtain an accurate list of electors before going through next year's General Synod appointments process.

We will be writing about the processes which are needed around Annual Parochial Church Meetings (APCMs) next issue (January 2020), but everyone appointed goes onto this confidential database, and needs to fill in a GDPR form. Sian has amended this as a word document, which can be completed electronically and returned via email to Church House. As long as the email is received from the individual's email address (and not a joint email address) they will accept this as their 'electronic signature'. (Forms available from Jo.Simister@derby.anglican.org)

Sian can also send paper copies out to you. Please advise how many you would like and what address to send them to. (Sian.Kellogg@derby.anglican.org).

There is a 1 hour online training about GDPR which we would encourage any parishes to complete. It can be accessed through the Parish Buyer scheme at a highly reduced rate, a fee of £10 per person, which PCC should consider investing in (https://www.parishbuying.org.uk/categories/gdpre-learning).

Awards for All – Lottery Funding

A quick and simple way to get small National Lottery grants of between £300 and £10,000. A good application should do at least one of these three things:

- bring people together and build strong relationships in and across communities
- improve the places and spaces that matter to communities
- enable more people to fulfil their potential by working to address issues at the earliest possible stage.

It could take up to 18 weeks to get the decision, with a further two weeks to pay your grant.

The funding is being made available through the Marsh Christian Trust. There are no application deadlines.


HOW THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IS STRUCTURED

All the talk about synods and councils and archdeacons and the like can sometimes be confusing to people who don't have a 'churchy' background.

Starting at the top of this organogram, we have the <u>Church of England</u>, which has its head office in London, and which decides a number of issues centrally. Its 'parliament' is the General Synod, about which we hear a couple of times a year. We can feed ideas and questions to this level, and even into legislation, via the lower level Synods — Diocese and Deanery. Our diocese sends three clergy and three lay representatives to General Synod.

The Church of England has <u>42 Dioceses</u>, which are divided between two provinces. In Derby we are very near the border – Derby (along with Lichfield, Leicester and Lincoln) is in the southern part, the <u>Province of Canterbury</u>, while Sheffield, Manchester, Chester, and Southwell&Nottingham are all in the northern Province of York.

The <u>Diocese of Derby</u> consists of the whole of Derbyshire and a few parishes on the fringes of the county near Stockport and in Staffordshire. It was formed in 1927, so will celebrate its centenary in 2027. The Cathedral is in Derby itself. The diocese



has an area of nearly one thousand square miles and serves a population of just over one million people, and has over 300 churches. It works in communities, schools, prisons and hospitals as well being represented in various other aspects of city and county life. Each diocese holds its own Diocesan Synod. Ours meets two or three times a year. Our deanery has 25 representatives on Derby Diocesan Synod – 14 clergy and 13 laity.

The Diocese of Derby is divided into two Archdeaconries, each with an archdeacon – ours is the Venerable Dr Christopher Cunlife. If you are a Warden who comes to be licenced at the annual Archdeacon's Visitation, you will meet him then.

The <u>Archdeaconry of Derby</u> was originally part of the Diocese of Lichfield, but was moved to form part of the Diocese of Southwell, when that diocese was created in 1884. In 1927 the Archdeaconries of Derby and Chesterfield became the new Diocese of Derby, as a response to population growth.

There are four deaneries in each archdeaconry. Ours is Derby City. We have a quarter of the diocese's population in our deanery, and around 50 clergy. Our Deanery Synod represents all our 35 parishes (including the Cathedral), plus chaplaincies and Bishop's Mission Orders.

Based on knowledge of both mental health and community development practices, the workshop gives simple models and practical guidelines that can help your church become a place where everyone thrives.

Livability's Corin Pilling says 'Churches have a unique opportunity to become places where it's not only accepted to talk about struggles and find support, but also build practices that can help the whole community's wellbeing. Live Well Together represents a vison of

community in the Bible where our wellbeing is tied into that of everybody. Mental health is not just the priority of somebody experiencing difficulty- it's something we all share. When we build a healthy community together, we live in a way which is able to include others as we learn to build resilience.'



BOOK REVIEWS: Karen Armstrong and Ruth Valerio




In our increasingly secular world, holy texts are at best seen as irrelevant, and at worst as an excuse to incite violence, hatred and division. So what value, if any, can scripture hold for us today? And if our world no longer seems compatible with scripture, is it perhaps because its original purpose has become lost?

Today we see the Quran being used by some to justify war and terrorism, the Torah to deny Palestinians the right to live in the Land of Israel, and the Bible to condemn homosexuality and contraception. The holy texts at the centre of all religious traditions are often employed selectively to underwrite arbitrary and subjective views. They are believed to be divinely ordained; they are claimed to contain eternal truths.

But as Karen Armstrong, a world authority on religious affairs, shows in this fascinating journey through millennia of history, this narrow reading of scripture is a relatively recent phenomenon. For hundreds of years these texts were instead viewed as spiritual tools: scripture was a means for the individual to connect with the divine, to transcend their physical existence, and to experience a higher level of consciousness. Holy texts were seen as fluid and adaptable, rather than a set of binding archaic rules or a 'truth' that has to be 'believed'.

Armstrong argues that only by rediscovering an open engagement with their holy texts will the world's religions be able to curtail arrogance, intolerance and violence. And if scripture is used to engage with the world in more meaningful and compassionate ways, we will find that it still has a great deal to teach us.

LOOKING FORWARD: THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY'S LENT BOOK:



The Archbishop's Lent book next year will be focused on the environment. It is written by Ruth Valerio. Each chapter goes through one of the days of creation, and brings together environmental, ethical and social concerns. The book will be published on 21st November 2019.

Saying Yes to Life lifts our focus from every day (and perfectly natural) concerns to issues that are impacting millions of lives around the world. As people made in the image of God, we are entrusted to look after what God has made – to share in the joy and creativity of God in making a difference for good. Ruth Valerio imaginatively draws on the Days of Creation (Genesis 1 - 2.2) in relating themes of light, water, land, the seasons, other creatures, humankind, Sabbath rest and resurrection hope to matters of environmental, ethical and social concern.

Foundational to the book are what it means to be human and, in particular, to be a follower of Jesus during Lent. Voices from other continents are heard throughout, and each chapter ends with discussion questions, a prayer, and specially commissioned art to aid action and contemplation.
