

# **Derby Poverty Commission**

The Derby Poverty Commission launched in April 2021 and is a direct response to the issue of poverty in Derby City, as highlighted during the Covid-19 pandemic. The Commission – chaired by Peter Robinson, Dean of Derby, and vice chair Paul Brookhouse, Project Manager of Derby Food 4 Thought Alliance – is an independent Commission with membership and participation from across all sectors in the city. The Derby Poverty Commission seeks to focus primarily on the real difficulties the people of Derby face with regards to poverty and the ill-effects it has. It looks to do this by:

- Understanding the nature of poverty and inequality in the city.
- Scrutinising the scope, range, and impact of poverty.
- Communicating to stakeholders about the nature of poverty.
- Examining the causes of poverty.
- Making recommendations and proposals for alleviating poverty.

During the year so far, we very quickly created 4 sub-groups to the commission, each looking at key areas of poverty within our city and how we can respond in short term as well as longer term. We also unanimously agreed that the Commission would benefit from being grass-rooted and seeking the input and involvement of our communities. To this end, we are forming a Poverty **Truth** Commission which joins lived-experience commissioners, alongside business & civic leaders.

In recent weeks, the rising cost of living crisis has very much consumed the attention and direction that the Commission is currently taking, which culminated in a letter being sent to key leaders in the city, one of its recommendations being a need for a strategic group to be established, aiming to focus on how we respond. This has now been established and meets on a weekly basis to look at how we can best support our city in these unpresented times.

We recognise the importance of the Faith Sector and how it can support and respond during these times, both practically and also spiritually. As part of this response, the Churches in our city can help by praying for:

- everyone involved in supporting those in need at this time
- financial resources and food provision to support those referred for help
- the impact the rising cost of living will have on mental health, DV and crime, as side effects
  of people not coping.

- Promote the role that faith communities can play in alleviating the impact, such as communication and signposting to the help and support available.
- Communicate what support is already available.
- Removing the stigma of asking for help Discuss how to get the message out to those sucked into poverty or who have never thought of themselves as struggling
- Create a plan for what faith communities can do immediately, in 3 months in 6 months.

YADA Collective - An innovative bar seeking to reimagine Derby's nightlife; the first in the Midlands to be alcohol-free

Founded by three university graduates, YADA Collective is an alternative and inclusive venue located on Green Lane. The first alcohol-free bar in Derby and the Midlands.

YADA Collective began as an idea in the summer of 2016 when Craig Picton, Rhondell Stabana, Julio Abraham and a team of other young adults decided to reimagine Derby's nightlife.

Since then, they've partnered with the Derby City Mission charity in 2017 to host dry bar pop-up events. As well as hosting numerous community support projects at the cosy BEAR café in 2019. Now, YADA has its own permanent alcohol-free bar and venue on Green Lane! Craig Picton, 26, one of the co-founders shares why he got behind the company: "As a Derby student I saw the realities of the night scene where party-goers endure lonely, disoriented walks home, often regretful of ever going out in the first place," he adds "YADA aims to show that there is another way."

A recent study by the alcohol-free brand, Freestar, discovered that over a quarter of British citizens have the desire to drink less. Following the pandemic, being alcohol conscious has become a growing trend with 37% of millennials actively finding ways to reduce their alcohol intake.

"We are more than just a bar," the co-director, Mark Innis, 27, shares. As a community interest company, YADA is devoted to a variety of social causes to help those within the local community.

University of Derby graduate and YADA co-founder, Rhondell Stabana, 26, explains: "Not

only do we want to provide a social space free from the pressures of excessive drinking, but also, an environment where charities and local businesses can partner together. We currently host a number of inclusive community projects at the bar, including worship nights, poetry sessions. We have plenty of space for more to begin too, so if you have any ideas for a regular community event, please do get in touch, we'd love to have you involved."

Collaborating with emerging breweries, the alcohol-free bar offers customers a selection of appetising alcohol-free cocktails, spirits, wines and kombucha. Exclusive non-alcoholic beer is available on draught for drinkers to relish and savour.

At the beginning of the UK lockdown, the company set up an online store to give their customers easy access to their favourite non-alcoholic drinks, with the option of buying in bulk and having them delivered straight to their door at an affordable price.

To pay homage to the previously derelict building, the team have created a modern bar space fused with the classic and rustic character of the original venue. Located near the Becketwell Scheme, YADA is pleased to be part of the regeneration of Green Lane and surrounding areas in Derby.

The YADA team are excited to welcome local residents, university students and non/moderating-drinkers from across the UK. All of whom can look forward to vibrant, joyful, and headache-free social evenings every Friday and Saturday from 5 pm to 11 pm at YADA.

In the future, the directors hope to have branches of YADA's bar across the whole of the UK, providing alcohol-free alternatives for the wider community of non-drinkers. # **DERBY CITY DEANERY: SHARING THE GOSPEL**



St Philips: Chaddesdon

An emerging Ecclesial community, serving Derby

I arrived at St Philips just before the pandemic to church plant as the enabling minister. The first and most important task is to see where God is already at work, to listen & pray. That was obviously challenging when I couldn't get out to see people.

In terms of an emerging ecclesial community a few people meet online & we began to establish a liturgical rhythm and a strong sense of community. That has proved to be very formative in what we are growing into, now we can meet in person. We now have a growing Sunday @ 10 cafe style church, with a focus on growing disciples, as we gather around Word and Sacrament.

What we are doing in Chaddesdon is not an experiment, it is Church, and is evolving as we grow and seek to listen, to both the context, and most importantly to God. What has been most encouraging is that we are seeing a real sense of fellowship form and our numbers are increasing as we welcome people from our local community, many of which have either not been part of church for years or have never been at all.

As well as growing the Sunday@10, we have focused on connecting with our wider community. I have a deep sense of our call as Anglican's, to be the church for the whole community, not just the congregation. Both life in all its fullness and the vision that all may flourish is both, embedded in the liturgy of the church plant, and in who we are seeking to be.

When the pandemic hit, I volunteered within the community and what developed was incredibly strong relational links with community partners. One thing that emerged was the lack of a community space or CAFE within the parish. I spent many hours in conversations with community partners and seeking funding in order to get a community CAFE off the ground. For many months, it felt like nothing was really happening, but I describe it as a time when the ground was being dug. Through generous funding from Derby Homes, the Co-op & other partners we had a grand opening of the community CAFE in December, with the place buzzing with community partners and local residents.

We launched to the community in January, opening the cafe on a Wednesday & Thursday 10.30-1 for coffee & an affordable lunch. We have pool and table tennis tables in the space, which is a place for many conversations! It has been an absolute delight to work with Derby Adult Learning & adults with learning disabilities, who run the CAFE on a Wednesday. We host a number of groups, including men's mental health & dementia groups, run by Derby County Community Trust, a grief CAFE and a menopause support group. After Easter, we will be hosting

a fortnightly debt clinic with Derby City Mission with financial backing from the Derwent community board.

We have also developed very strong links with Breadsall Hiltop Primary School, where I am a governor, and with St Andrews School. In the cafe will be displaying artwork from Breadsall Hiltop, to celebrate the work of some talented young people in our community.

We are continuing to grow and develop what we do, looking for signs of the kingdom and partnering with God in His mission in this place. The church community is both growing and fragile at the same time, though I take great heart from realising that the earliest Christian communities were similar. As well as our community that meets on a Sunday, we are beginning to meet for worship around the CAFE with morning prayer, a Lent group & Eucharists and we are excited for baptisms happening over Easter.

We would really value your prayer for wisdom of how to grow as we seek to see glimpses of the Kingdom of God. My prayer for the Church and the Cafe, is that they would be a place where all are welcome & none are left behind. A place where all flourish and experience life in all the fullness that Jesus brings.

St Philips is part of a wider fellowship of churches across this part of the city and I am particularly grateful for some wonderful colleagues and our partnering in the gospel together.

# (Not Really) Pioneering Easter in Derby's West End

It feels strange to write about 'pioneering' Easter. How can one 'pioneer' the celebration and remembrance of the single most significant moment in the history of the cosmos? This year, however, it is even stranger, because as I write this, there are personal priorities which seem to overshadow the greatest day in history; but this experience is not unique, and I'm sure many of you reading can relate.



Sent by St Alkmund's (Kedleston Road) in November 2020, we moved into The Mission House owned by, and just behind, St Anne's Church in Derby's West End. The estate is small, with just two ways in and out from the rabbit warren of just over 800 flats and homes. Flattened in the slum clearances of the 1950s and 60s, just the church, hall, and Mission House remained standing as council housing was built around them. With a community of Anglican Sisters living in the house, there was a persistent missional presence in the West End – indeed, I sometimes describe what we are doing there as being 'modern monks and nuns, just married with kids and without the uniform...'. As I wander around and speak to those living on the estate, Easter is indeed far from their minds (beyond perhaps the parents starting to think about chocolate). Their priorities range from caring for a relative, to antisocial behaviour, to utility bills about to skyrocket – again this is not unique to our context, and certainly not to our present day (sharing a privy with 100 other homes anyone?). So how do we 'do Easter' in the midst of this? What does the death and resurrection of the Son of God have to do with the mundanity and struggle of life in one of Derby's most persistently deprived communities?

As we build trust here, I have been struck by the sheer lack of hope amongst many I meet. One lady, who visits us to pray because 'I feel so good when you two pray for me', is caught in a cycle of addiction, where the very people who the world says should be the most supportive, are precisely the ones knocking her down. Others talk about taking the law into their own hands when the police are seen to be doing nothing, and young people are saying (I will never forget this conversation), 'It's too late for me, but it's good you're here cos you can help the younger ones.'

'Doing Easter' for us is about practicing the presence of God in this place, just as the Sisters began to do 150 years ago, listening to those around us, responding with love and hope as we are beginning to find we can. It is not about offering an alternative or, even worse, a mere distraction to the mundanity and the struggle, but meeting folk where they are so we may point towards Jesus who meets them in exactly the same place. Whether through word or deed, I invite you to do the same this year.

# **Spotlight: Modern Slavery**

# Modern Slavery update from Revd Rachael Brooks.

In summer 2021 I was appointed as Diocesan Lead for Modern Slavery to keep Bishop Libby informed of what's happening nationally and locally – both diocese-wide and in individual parishes. Essentially, I'm a holder of, and conduit for, information. I've been trying to identify what is currently being done on this issue in the diocese. As with many aspects of Church life, the pandemic has brought our attentiveness to modern slavery to a halt. I am keen to know what is happening across the diocese. I am working with two organisations:

#### 1. The Derby and Derbyshire Modern Slavery Partnership.

This was set up following the Modern Slavery Act (2015) to link public services, charities and businesses so together they can more effectively spot modern slavery happening, to provide awareness training, and to enable support for victims and survivors once identified.

#### 2. The Clewer Initiative

This was set up by Bishop Alastair Redfern as the Church of England's response to modern slavery nationally. Its focus is on raising awareness of modern slavery in our dioceses through education and national campaigns. They offer training and support.

#### **Resources available from the Clewer Initiative:**

#### National concerns.

Modern slavery has slipped down the political agenda and has been conflated with immigration concerns where it involves foreign nationals. The Clewer Initiative and General Synod have been highlighting the problems with the proposed changes to the Nationality and Borders Bill which will make it easier to return victims of modern slavery to their country of origin by limiting the time available to disclose that they've been enslaved.

This needs prayer.
