

#### A reflection for lent

In the traditional reading for the first Sunday of lent, it is interesting to notice precisely when Jesus is led into the desert to be confronted with temptation; it comes at him immediately after his baptism by John in the Jordan.

In this great moment, when his sense of God's call and love was so dramatically confirmed, he has to face the whispering voices, the seductive lure of worldly treasures and recognise them for what they are. Jesus has to do this now and win a victory over them. If he doesn't, they would undoubtedly meet him suddenly in the middle of his work and may well overwhelm him.

The temptations play on the very strength he has just received. The divine voice is heard to say "you are my Son whom I love" which prompts the demonic voice to get to work; 'Okay, if you really are the Son of God, then surely you don't want to go hungry out here in the desert do you? Surely you want people to see who you are, so why not do something spectacular and turn these stones into bread? Or when I take you to the highest point of the temple, why not throw yourself down and let the angels lift you up in their hands?'

Jesus is committed to living off God's Word, committed to loving, serving and trusting him completely, so he knows the score and sees through the trickery answering each time with the Bible and with God.

The temptations we all face day by day and at critical moments of decision and vocation in our lives, may be very different from those of Jesus but they have exactly the same intention. They are not simply trying to entice us into committing this or that sin, they are trying to distract us, stop us, throw us off the scent from the glorious vocation God has for each of us.

The enemy will do everything possible to halt the purposes of God, so if we have heard God's voice welcoming us as his children, then we will also hear the nagging voices of distraction. We need to be aware, alert, on the case and deal with them just as Jesus did. We need to store scripture in our hearts and learn how to use it, deploying the Word of God to fight back and resist. When Jesus was in the desert, the gospels tell us angels attended him. Jesus didn't make his journey alone and nor do we. So as we journey with Jesus towards Jerusalem this lent, let us keep our eyes firmly on God and trust him for everything.

We need to ensure that communication to the parishes is open and honest and the Leadership Team will be meeting at the beginning of March to discuss how we take the discussion further.

Thank you to everyone who has agreed to be a member of our Synod. We do still have churches with no representation. It is not too late to join, please encourage people to come forward, particularly in the more rural parishes, your voices need to be heard too.

APCM's will be held as usual this year, by 31st May 2021. No new electoral roll is required, but the officers need to be elected. We will be hearing more about holding APCM's in the next few weeks. # Have you been called?

Five years ago I had no idea what a Reader was and now I am licensed (6<sup>th</sup> Oct 2019,) to preach, teach and, 'to encourage the ministries of God's people.' Hopefully my experience will encourage others to prayerfully consider a calling to this valuable ministry.

My wife and I are both late arrivals to the C of E but have been Christians for many years in Sheffield House Church. Our road to Anglicanism commenced when our youngest son had to gain a qualifying connection to be married at Hathersage church in 2013, and he wanted us to go with him for moral support; a long story short, we stayed! We both felt we had something to offer, so we left our Sheffield church with the blessing of the minister, and my road to Readership began.

I was asked to become a member of the PCC but our House Church leader suggested that I should consider becoming a Reader. My sister-in-law was talking to me about, 'finishing strongly', and there were passages of scripture which kept cropping up confirming my calling, so I started to 'push the doors' of what I believed was my Readership vocation.

Initially I spoke to my vicar, who put my name forward to the PCC for consideration. The next stage was a one-day vocational course, followed by an in-depth interview at Derby and a letter of acceptance from Bishop Alastair to commence training, September 2017.

I started a two-year training course for a certificate in Theology, Ministry and Mission, with additional weekends dedicated to Readership training. A six-week placement at Newbold Parish Church and a commitment to lead and preach on a monthly basis at Hathersage provided an opportunity to put my training into practice. There is now a new and dedicated Reader training course for the Derby Diocese.

My licensing at Derby Cathedral by Bishop Libby was a very special occasion. As St Michael & All Angels was now in vacancy, I was soon regularly leading and preaching across the benefice.

2020 saw the arrival of the Coronavirus pandemic, the advent of Zoom meetings and a very different way of 'doing' church. It has been a challenging and busy time, but I am secure in my calling and knowledge that God has called me to the ministry of Reader.

#### **OUR KEY PRIORITIES**

With the publication of the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse (IICSA), safeguarding is very much in focus across the Church at the present time. We have a busy year ahead and will be focussing on the following areas:

**Past Cases Review 2 -** We are very grateful to all parishes for returning the requested information and our preparatory work for this significant project is now well under way. We have two independent reviewers identified and hope that our review will commence in April.

**DBS checks -** We are in the process of training parish representatives for our streamlined DBS process which allows parishes to complete applications more quickly and efficiently. All parishes need to have this in place by 5<sup>th</sup> April 2021 - the training is straightforward and we are here to support throughout.

**PSO events -** We are pleased to be able to let you know that we have arranged two PSO events: Saturday 24 April 9.30am – 12.30pm and Wednesday 12 May 1.30 – 4.30pm. At the moment it seems likely that both events will be over Zoom and booking will be made available via Eventbrite.

We will be looking at updates around our key activity, IICSA and PCR2. In addition, we will be having a short presentation from Daphne Franks around the safeguarding issues arising from predatory marriage.

A little reminder ... Parish Dashboard: Can we just remind you about the Parish Dashboard which is there to assist you in ensuring your parish is fully compliant with safeguarding requirements. We will be focussing on the Dashboard later this year but if you have any queries in the meantime, please contact Sue Griffin, Safeguarding Co-Ordinator (sue.griffin@derby.anglican.org) for further information.

## Common Fund 2021

This information has been sent by the Derby Diocesan Board of Finance to PCC Treasurers and Secretaries:

#### How has the Covid-19 pandemic affected Common Fund this year?

We realise that the impact of this pandemic has profoundly affected our life both as a Diocese and at Parish level, along with the lives of people in our parish communities. This has meant that many parishes have found difficulty in maintaining payments against their 2020 request and pledge. Yet, despite all this, there has been a good response during recent months from our parishes holding faith with the Common Fund, which is the principal source for paying clergy stipends and housing as well as services to parishes. It is with great pride that we hear of inventive measures parishes have taken to help maintain their own income through recovery appeals etc, and the generous responses they have received both from their congregation and local communities.

#### What about 2021 and beyond?

In October 2020, Diocesan Synod approved the 2021 budget including the use of around £1.4m of reserves to bridge the gap in the loss of income and to continue the Diocesan Mission as we consult and launch the new Diocesan Vision. The DBF Budget through to 2025 indicates use of reserves up to £4m over the five-year period, which means digging even further into our reserves at the detriment of asset value and annual returns, but needs must in such circumstances. The Diocese will be seeking to make further savings in 2021 and beyond, in Parish Support, property management and with help from the Board of Education reducing their funding request in line with their commitments made to the Diocesan Synod.

#### How does this relate to Common Fund requests for 2021?

Common fund remains a significant element of Diocesan resources – equating to approx. 50-55% of overall income. With increasing costs year on year, and reducing transition funding from the Church Commissioners, Common Fund becomes increasingly important to our diocesan life.

We are aware that it might be difficult to commit how much you will be able to continue to give for 2021. For the realisation of the Diocesan Budget for 2021, we need to ask you to think about how much you can continue to realistically pledge to give as your parish hopefully starts a journey of recovery from the challenges of this year.

We acknowledge that parishes face their own financial challenges so want to help you in any way we can, and for parishes to support one another in their benefices and deaneries, to meet the Common Fund together. Some parishes already take this approach locally. We are here to support parishes, so please be in touch if we can help.

Please be realistic, challenging and generous as you consider prayerfully your contribution so that mission and ministry is supported in every parish.

#### What might the future look like?

The future of our Diocese will be determined by the launch and implementation of the Diocesan Vision, the financial resilience of the Board of Finance and the financial resilience of our Parishes.

As we journey on together, we must be brave, radical, and outward looking. Our prayer is that we yearn to grow the Kingdom of God, for all ages, increase our diversity, across every geographical, socio-economic and cultural context. We can only do that with your help as we reshape our work, embodying our values of generous faith, courageous hope and lifegiving love.

#### **Common Fund in the Peak Deanery**

Despite 2020 being a difficult year for all, the Peak Deanery managed to fulfil 83.7% of the Common Fund request. You contributed £758,706 from a request of £906,813

Our 2021 request is £919,352, an increase of around 1.38% on last year. Please prayerfully consider the situation of your individual churches.

Many churches have been able to take advantage of the Parish Giving scheme and also used the 'donate' buttons on the A Church Near You, websites, social media etc. Thank you for being so pro-active.

# Raymond Ross Grant news

Peak Deanery churches have recently been successful in securing grants from the Raymond Ross Fund.

Congratulations to all involved, the quality of the applications has been outstanding.

**Hartington:** Hear our prayer! To enable all to access worship within and without the church building. Currently there are issues with hearing both within the church walls and streaming to the community beyond the walls

**Grindleford**: A mixed project to: introduce a café area into the back of the church, provide a community space for a variety of church, shop and village-related activities; repair and strengthen the roof so that we can fit solar panels, as part of a wide ranging initiative to save energy and reduce emissions in our village; work with our community shop, residents and schoolchildren

**Eyam:** The 'Access for All" project which is Phase 1 of a multi-phase church re-ordering project. Access for All will allow people with restricted mobility to safely enter the church and provide a safe means of emergency exit for all users of the building

**Edale**: Heritage and hospitality project. The project will have 3 main components: Re-ordering of west end of church to create a hospitality area and complete our education zone [faculty already obtained]; Disabled access to the church; Creation of a toilet with disabled access

## Inspiring at New Mills, St George's





Fr. Owain Mitchell has had an eventful first year as Vicar of New Mills. Licensed by Bishop Libby just weeks before the lockdown in March 2020, he hadn't planned for the pandemic, nor the closure of the church and churchyard due to the weathervane on the top of the church spire becoming unsafe.

Thankfully the weathervane was removed just prior to the March lockdown, allowing the churchyard to open again and for Fr Owain to familiarise himself with the church where he has been conducting live streamed services. January 2021 saw the re-installation of the 'golden cockerel' or also fondly know as the 'brass hen'

## Giving thanks and donations

The Diocese of Derby is now supporting an initiative by Christian Aid to give both thanks and a donation once you have received the vaccine.
