Dear Friends

Welcome to this next edition to the Peak deanery Newsletter and my thanks to Eileen for her work on compiling and producing this important way of keeping in touch, sharing information and promoting that we are the top of the `Premier League" of Deaneries in the C of E!

As I draw you into the content of the Newsletter we acknowledge what we have faced since the last one. Record temperatures have scorched the earth, left a wake of destruction through wildfires and drained reservoirs causing water shortages and many are facing a difficult winter ahead as people contemplate record high energy prices to pay to heat and service your home.

In the First World 21st century it feels a scandal that some families will face choices of heating or eating and clearly for the most vulnerable and deprived there needs to be greater help and support to avert real suffering. Not only are churches providing Food and Clothing banks; Community Lunches; hot food during the holidays for families, debt advice, but also we are hearing of the opportunity to create Warm Centres during the winter, where people can gather to meet, eat etc.

We recognise that many of our churches and congregations are not able to provide the resources if there was a demand, and many may well struggle themselves to heat their buildings and pay the bills. Therefore, it is really important that we work together within the deanery and our benefices/parishes where we can to support one another and perhaps enable some real opportunities to collaborate, share resources and ideas, signpost people to churches offering specific support for the vulnerable; meet together for joint worship in the coldest parts of the winter, and initiatives being worked through to support older members of our churches and communities, as well as families who may struggle in the times ahead.

As schools return and we move from the holiday period back into routines, may we feel refreshed and ready to play our part in making positive contributions to the commitments we have and the compassionate causes that we care about. How we wish that life was a bit calmer, less uncertain and things would return to a default point when we felt life was good. The reality is that we can't.

It is true as well of the Church. There feels to be a state of flux between what we hold dear and count as traditional, against a fuzzy picture of what might emerge from the many vacancies in the deanery we are living though or facing that will in some situations reshape and redefine ministry and what we understand to be mission. This too is unsettling and placing huge demands of Churchwardens and existing ministers to maintain patterns of worship and offer pastoral care.

I wish I had Harry Potter's wand to make it all right, but there are no magic tricks or words to solve anything we are facing at the moment. It will be through engaged faith, prayer, talking, listening, courage, trust in God, compassion, care, collaboration, learning, challenging, hope and desire to engage that will bring change, renewal, transformation and life, whether it is reversing climate change, bringing a lasting and just peace in Ukraine, supporting and helping people who are in need, or working for the growth and well-being of God's Church in the Peak Deanery.

It is going to be tough and costly, but together and with God, we can do it!

Thank you for your support and prayers for me in this funny world of Acting and my prayer is that you will have more permanence and continuity to move forward to-gether with an Area Dean when they are appointed.

From our Lay Chair, Christine McMullen

Well, what a summer we have been having! Temperatures such as I remember from my childhood, airports and railway stations in confusion, a wonderful Buxton festival in the middle of beautiful welldressings and fast approaching 15 churches in the Deanery with no incumbent (Eileen's calculation, not mine - though she is usually right.) Perhaps I should be saying,' what a challenging summer we have had!'

As a Reader in a church whose vicar went off sick in August 2021, I have, like many of you worked with our Wardens to find priests to take baptisms (We have them on three Sundays each month), to celebrate the Communion with us and to officiate at weddings though we have fewer of these than we do baptisms. Several local clergy have been very helpful. The wardens have looked after the fabric of the building, led the new Bible study group and master minded social events: I have preached mostly and taken the funerals and including the burial of ashes, there have been 43 of these this year so far. Together we have led Services of the Word, started



a baptism visiting scheme, maintained Vestry Hour each week and kept in touch with our local school. And we rejoice in the positives of all these signs of life and potential growth.

But we can feel abandoned, not by our local clergy, many of whom have been wonderful, but more by the diocesan arrangements that can leave so many of us in this situation. One problem is that the diocese can only afford 1 full time incumbent to every 15,000 people (or thereabouts) and how many rural communities do you have to pull into one to get to 15,000 people? Covid did not help because any plans that were in the pipeline had to be put on hold, but at last there are now 3 Archdeacons, so let's pray that they get their combined plan together soon, so they can concentrate on building up their specialist Archdeaconry.

This is not how I planned to spend retirement, like many of you, but I do it because my faith has been at the heart of my life since I was a child. Working through a church is one way of sharing the gospel in places where it is unknown and standing alongside people in times of loss, pain and stress as well at times of celebration and hope, as Jesus did.

So please, people further up the hierarchical ladder than we are, please get on with finding ways to help the rural areas!



Gaia at Derby Cathedral 22nd September - 16th October 2022

Gaia is a touring artwork measuring seven metres in diameter and created from 120dpi detailed NASA imagery of the Earth's surface. The artwork provides the unique opportunity to see our planet on this scale, floating in three-dimensions above the nave of the Cathedral.

A specially made surround sound composition by BAFTA award winning composer Dan Jones is played alongside the sculpture.

This spectacular installation stimulates thought over key issues of climate change, creation, and our place on the Earth. The <u>events programme</u> that runs alongside Gaia invites visitors to enjoy wellbeing events, music, and nature walks, and contemplate the themes presented by the artwork.

Gaia is programmed in association with <u>Derby Festé</u> and is kindly sponsored by the <u>University of Derby</u> and <u>Cosy Direct</u>.

Thank you to all who have been involved with Parish Returns for 2021, the Peak Deanery had a whopping 95% submission for Statistics for Mission and 99% submission for the Return of Parish Finance. It would also be useful to know who to remove from the system, as emails will continue to go to their addresses. The system isn't linked to our CMS database.

Energy Footprint Returns

Incumbents, wardens, or treasurers in each parish have access to the Energy Footprint site within the C of E Portal and need to enter their information even though it is now 'closed for 2021 data collection'. It will help you with your Energy Audit and an aid for Parish Buying. Again, those with access queries please contact eileen.burt@derby.anglican.org
