Dear Friends

It is really good to be able to introduce myself as I take on the role of Assistant Area Dean, working alongside David and Louise.

I'm the Priest-in-Charge of Beeley and Edensor in the south of the deanery, being licensed in April. I also look after the heritage and tourism strategy for the diocese and have been getting to know the wider diocese through visiting parishes and meeting those involved in heritage and promoting the county as a visitor destination.

My life before April was quite different as for the first time since I was ordained in 1996 I'm ministering away from Kent where I was born and brought up. I served in the Dioceses of Canterbury and Rochester, beginning as a curate in Walmer on the East Kent coast, then serving as Vicar of three rural parishes just outside Canterbury, moving on to a suburban parish south of the M25 in Sevenoaks and finally going back to Canterbury in 2017. In Canterbury I was Rector of St Martin and St Paul's, two churches near the centre of the city, St Martin's being the oldest church in the English-speaking world, where St Augustine worshipped in the 6th century on his mission to southern England, sent by Gregory the Great. In my time in Kent, I worked a lot in vocations ministry, and was also Rural Dean of Sevenoaks, later Area Dean of Canterbury. I'm married to Clare, who works in Initial Teacher Training.

I'm enjoying getting to know a new area of the country and discovering the Peak District. I'm also finding my way around the diocese and the deanery, as I minister in a different part of the world.

For me ministry is about people and about working with them to help them flourish as individuals and as disciples of Christ. I look forward to meeting people across the Peak Deanery and hearing the stories of God at work in a new part of the kingdom for me, as I serve in my new role working alongside the other members of the Deanery Leadership Team.

Home visits, visits to care homes and hospitals, and thankfully permission to continue to offer Holy Communion to those who wish to receive it on my rounds, all make me feel that I am doing something rather privileged and special.
