Welcome to the November edition of the South East Derbyshire Deanery newsletter.



Notes from the Diocesan Synod meeting held at St Werburgh's, Derby on Saturday 12 October 2019.

I attended Synod along with Christine, Giles, Gordon, Jan, John, and Karen and these notes are really our observations and reflections.

The opening business related to finance and the headlines were

- The 2020 budget has been set showing a planned deficit of £467,000
- There will be an increase of 2% on the Common Fund request
- The formula for calculating parish's share of the Common Fund will be updated with the latest available attendance figures and transitional arrangements will apply to those parishes with significant increases or decreases.

There was some general discussion about the wisdom of setting another deficit budget and the opportunity to re-examine the Common Fund formula. Bishop Libby reflected that it was now 6 months since her appointment and the honeymoon was over! She was looking to be more vocal in articulating our shared vision for the Diocese. The year 2020 was a good encouragement to have 2020 vision for the work of the Diocese through to our centenary in 2027. This vision would incorporate our financial sustainability and the way we sought financial help from parishes. So that we focus on working through that vision it was important that we kept 2020 finances in a steady state.

The main agenda item was 'Church Planting'. Ric Thorpe, Bishop of Islington, spoke and led a discussion.

Bishop Libby commented that roughly 100 years ago some people were thinking about the 'plant' of the Diocese of Derby from the Diocese of Southwell. In became clear that a lot of us were worshipping in church communities that had themselves been planted. Renewal, revitalisation, church planting are all part of our history.

In today's world church planting can take many forms

- Re-opening closed church buildings
- Refreshing an existing church
- Create new congregations in existing church buildings
- Working in new housing estates or estates that have no church presence.
- Using community spaces and facilities
- Using a café
- Going into schools
- Making use of other church buildings, such as church halls

Some basic principles were suggested form whatever form of 'plant' you were considering

- Be prayerful
- Discern who you are not reaching, rather than working with the area that you feel comfortable with
- Partner any existing presence rather than taking them over; but if it is a partnership make sure the other partner wants to be revitalised!
- Have a strong leader with a team it should not be a one-man show
- Seek authority, especially when crossing parish boundaries or likely to impact existing church work
- Use a space that supports the aspiration of the place but be prepared to be flexible, the start may not be the destination

• Be properly resourced with funding, training and equipment

One representative commented: I found the presentation on church planting interesting, the definition used was far wider than I had previously considered and realised that perhaps we are doing church planting more than we realise with fellowship groups meeting in pubs and cafes.

Another questioned the balance between planting anew and fertilising excising church communities with resources. 'For me a key point which was not addressed here, but will have to be addressed, is how the diocese is going to allocate its ever-diminishing resources between supporting existing churches and planting new ones. St Werburgh's where we were meeting was held up as a wonderful example of planting into an old formerly disused church, but I am mindful that the "St Werbs" project has been controversial, and some have argued that the funds could have been better deployed into churches that were still open.

In developing a new strategy planting will no doubt have its place, but there is clearly much further consideration needed as to the balance to strike between planting anew and giving adequate doses of fertiliser (i.e. resource) to the churches that are already there.'

A third opinion expressed by one of our representatives: 'I was privileged to attend the Diocesan Spirituality Day led by +Libby on the previous Thursday. It was clear from that day that she is genuinely seeking to discern God's will for our diocese and is going to allow time for the 'formation' of ideas. It was significant that when Libby wrapped up the presentation on church plants she made it clear that this was just one strand of what God might be doing and that we shouldn't take our eyes off of other things being explored. My feeling is that we are in for interesting times in our diocese and that is not just about reducing the budget deficit, important as that is.'

Synod then rather scooted through other business.

The formula for calculating the size of Deanery Synods was agreed. South East Derbyshire will have a maximum membership of 26 clergy and 59 members of the laity. Parishes should hear before the end of the year on how many representatives they can send to the Deanery Synod.

Synod agreed unanimously to adopt the National Safeguarding Policy. The roll out of the new arrangements for DBS work to parishes is proceeding. Our administrator, Angela, is always on hand to help any of our parishes who are uncertain about using the new arrangements as are our deanery safeguarding officers (contact details on page 10).

The Diocese has lost some of its delegates to the General Synod. Arrangements are in hand to fill them.

Synod was told about a recent peer review undertaken by three visiting members from other dioceses with our Diocesan leaders. Bishop Libby commented on the helpful feedback received as we discern our vision. One of our representatives picked up on the following summary of findings:' Finally, we were left with the sense that this is a pivotal point in the life of the Church in the Diocese of Derby. In Bishop Libby's words, 'the kingdom of God is very near'. We encourage you strongly as a team to raise people's hope, engender more adventure, and draw them along with you on the exciting journey which lies ahead.'

Rev Peter Davey stood down as Chair of the House of Clergy having held the post for some seven years. Peter was thanked and wished well in his early retirement.






















Safeguarding Training

There are also some existing sessions available in nearby areas if you wish to enrol on any of these, please do so via the link



Below is a chart of which roles require safeguarding training. You will see that the names of courses have changed (i.e C1 is now called Foundation Training or introduction to safeguarding) but you only have to renew your certificate if it is over 3 years old or if you have not attended a course

Safeguarding Training Matrix - January 2020 Onwards

Training is refreshed every three years at the highest level previously taken, plus refresh of specialist modules





Notes 1 - If involved in recruitment of Paid or Volunteer, Ordained or Lay

2 - Leadership training must be up-to-date prior to senior staff refreshing the Senior Leaders training

3 - PCC Members only if involved in recruitment of Paid or Volunteer, Ordained or Lay. Does not apply to other volunteer helpers.

The above roles are not an exhaustive list but aim to cover the most common roles in a parish. Those in the following roles are also encouraged to complete Basic Awareness and Foundation, which may also be completed by any member of the congregation: Vergers, Servers, Welcomers, Caretakers, Refreshment Helpers, Shop Staff, Sidespersons, Flower Arrangers, Administrative Staff, Bell-ringers, Choir / Music Group Members, Sound / AV Technicians



Statistics for Mission Online Data Recording


A reminder that the online recording system is now open to record statistics. At present figures for 'The October Count' can be entered and at the end of December data for church attendances, weddings, baptisms etc. during 2019 can be entered. Each church should have a password to get on to the system. If you cannot access the site due to password problems or would like some help entering the data. Please contact Angela

GDPR and the Contact Management System (Directory)

Contact details for clergy, church staff and parish officers (wardens, PCC secretary, parish safeguarding link, treasurer etc) are kept on the Contact Management System (CMS) It is very important that this is kept up to date with the correct person listed for posts and their details up to date . Church of England employees (including Angela) are not allowed to keep any lists or databases on their computer or on paper and should always use the CMS for contacting people under GDPR rules. The employee and the Church of England risk disciplinary measures if this is not adhered to. This has led to occasions where people do not get emails or letters because their details are not listed or are entered as ex-directory.

A Contact details form is now available that can be completed electronically and sent in by email to ensure your details are correct. This is only possible is you have a personal (not a shared) email. Otherwise A paper version is available from Angela. A copy of the electronic version will be sent out with every emailed newsletter and a paper version with every posted newsletter. These can be returned to enquiries @derby.anglican.org or Enquires, Derby Church House, Full St, Derby.
