Dear friends in South East Derbyshire Deanery,

Looking back at what I wrote at this time last year, there is a real sense of déjà vu. I started last year's July Newsletter by saying,

'As we look to reopen churches slowly and carefully, I am conscious that this has come at a cost, as expectations are managed, truths are distorted (people have a tendency to hear what they want to hear) and people try to bend rules. '

We are however in a different place, although what I said then does still have some resonance. Vaccination has started and many churches, although not all be any means, have been open for some of the year.

The world, however, has changed; our communities have changed, and church has changed.

Just because we can go back to things as they were, doesn't mean that we should. Covid cases locally are growing. Not everyone is vaccinated and as the NHS website says,

'While there are cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) in the UK, there is a risk you can catch it or pass it on. You could still catch or spread it, even if you're fully vaccinated.'

In these circumstances, can I encourage you to think about a few things.

Firstly, manage the risk, read the 12 pages on the Church of England website about church in the new context and go slowly in restarting, so that everyone can feel safe. I used to be a nurse on an infectious diseases' unit, to stop disease spreading you managed the risk so please look at the advice. For instance, think about wearing a mask to care for you brother or sister in Christ, keep church doors open to improve ventilation, if people wish to social distance respect that, think about how you administer communion. Each church is different, so reduce the risk in your context and love your fellow church member.

1 Corinthians 10: 23 -24 says this;

"I have the right to do anything," you say—but not everything is beneficial. "I have the right to do anything"—but not everything is constructive. No one should seek their own good, but the good of others.

Try and remember this in reopening.

Secondly, invest in self-care by taking a break. None of us can keep going for ever. Also, if your church leader is off respect that and care for them. It has been a tough year and I am sure none of you would message them on social media, drop stuff into vicarages or leave messages on phones but I do know it happens. If it is urgent talk to your warden or contact us. Just so you are aware I am on leave at the end of this month and the beginning of August, but Angela or Brian will help, if you need it, or find someone who can. Your Vicar will be better for the leave and so will your church. It is your chance to do good for those who serve you or, as Proverbs 4: 27 puts it, 'Do not withhold good from those to whom it is due, when it is in your power to act'.

Thirdly, can I also encourage you to think about what you have learnt and not rush back into doing church as you always did. There are things that may never restart in some of our contexts and new things that need to spring up. Life and community are different, and our expectations need to adjust to a new context. Many people have found the church through online worship, or through the missional caring that has happened. Learn from this and pray about the next steps, before pressing the reset button to do what we have always done.

Fourthly, as we emerge from lockdown, can I encourage you to look to the future. The pandemic has caused people to think anew about God and there are great opportunities for mission. Look and see what God is doing in your community and celebrate that. It may have been a long time since March 2020, and it might, at times, have felt like a brutal wilderness which would never end. When I pray and think on the last year, this verse from Isaiah chapter 43 comes to mind;

See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland.

God has been at work, is at work and will be working in the future, making a way through the difficulties of this world so that all can know him. Look for the new things God is doing where you are and think about how you can grow church, transform lives and build community in your place.

Angela said I would need more than one page to write this, and she was right, but I have got to the final bits.



Parish Finance Returns


Incumbents, wardens or treasurers in each parish will have access to the Parish Returns site within the C of E Portal and need to enter financial information for 2020 online. The portal is now open and information should be submitted of the audited financial report has been passed by PCC. A copy of the report should also be sent to the Diocese and Area Dean preferably by email. This should be done by 31st July if at all possible. If your APCM hasn't been possible by then, then the audited account details can be entered and a note at the end explaining that they have not been passed by APCM yet. She is happy to assist with the process for those who need help with the technology or to add new names to list of those able to access the site in your parish or issue new login and passwords if they have been forgotten!




So Everyone Can Hear








There is no bar to others completing this who don't 'qualify', as increased awareness at this level helps to communicate the importance of safeguarding within the church community. The Leadership module is a mixture of reading and preparation work, two 'Zoom' sessions, and some Review and Evaluation work.
