
At the start of 2022 few of us thought we would still be talking about restrictions and COVID. I know when I first talk about COVID I said it would be a marathon not a sprint, but it is a very long marathon. So, at the start of the year, I have been thinking about what we have learnt over the last 2 years and what the future looks like. One thing that COVID has given us is freedom and boundaries.

General Synod Report November 2021 group of sessions

Firstly, I'd like to thank you if you voted for me for General Synod. I hope that over the next five years I'll be able to report back to you from the Synod, and just as importantly, to represent this Deanery's concerns at the Synod, so please do feel free to email me or buttonhole me at Deanery Synod meetings.

The newly elected General Synod gathered in London in November for its inauguration and first group of sessions in its five-year term.

Unfortunately, Her Majesty the Queen was unable to attend the Inauguration of Synod as usual, but her youngest son, Prince Edward, the Earl of Wessex, deputised and shared her message of prayerful support.



After the induction day there was an inauguration service at Westminster Abbey. I found this a moving and uplifting experience, especially after all the restrictions of Covid-19.

There was then a day and a half of business. In summary:

- The archbishops set the tone for the new Synod in their joint presidential address, with a focus on how Synod might journey together, listening to each other and the Holy Spirit and being mindful of the past whilst moving forward together.
- In the debate of the Report of the Business Committee the Archbishop of Canterbury clarified his recent <u>statement</u> following his meeting with Ghanaian church leaders regarding proposed legislation which would criminalise LGBT+ people. LGBT+ Synod members welcomed the clarification.
- Synod backed a motion to begin the process of drawing up legislation which will allow for dioceses endowed with greater historical wealth to be generous and help less well-off dioceses.
- Synod supported a motion from the Diocese of Leeds which calls on the Government and political parties to take measures to reduce the wealth gap between the rich and poor in our society. There was acknowledgment of all that local churches are doing and have been doing, particularly in the pandemic, to help the poorest in our communities, and a call for reflection from dioceses to see where and how they can protect the most vulnerable.
- Synod received a 2022 financial update with proposals for apportionment from the Archbishops' Council, which recognised the immense impact the Coronavirus pandemic has had on diocesan and church finances, despite the incredible efforts of parishes and dioceses during this challenging time. Recovery will be difficult and requires every single one of us to address the need for transforming the financial effectiveness as well as transforming the spiritual and missional effectiveness of the Church of England.

- Canon John Spence stated money is not the end, it is merely the means. This is not a time to be frightened but a time to be determined. Above all there is a need for us to trust in Christ and trust in each other.
- There were presentations on the CofE's Vision and Strategy and the Governance Review, with an opportunity for questions. The Vision and Strategy talks about a 'mixed ecology' which simply means the church expressing itself in many different ways, including regular worship, online church, initiatives like messy church, cafes and clubs, and chaplaincies. The Archbishop of York emphasised that parishes are at the heart of this. The vision is that parishes will be revitalised for mission from which flows a flourishing of new Christian communities, where every person has the opportunity to encounter the transformation a life centred on Jesus Christ can bring. In this context part of Synod's work is to see what God is doing and align resources and training to this. The vision is to be simpler, humbler and bolder.

The Synod was very formal at times, and as in the Houses of Parliament, there are various procedures to follow if you want to ask a question or take part in a debate. But the formality did not hide the many positive messages we heard about working together over the next five years to face the current financial and structural challenges. It was also encouraging in informal discussion to hear of the many exciting things that are

Safeguarding Leadership Courses - now booking

The Safeguarding Leadership module replaces C2, C3, and 'refresher' training, and is a requirement for all those who have any leadership responsibility in the church. All those with the Bishop's license (clergy, readers and lay ministers), churchwardens, and many others who hold positions of leadership in work with children, young people or adults who may be at risk or are vulnerable must complete this course **every 3 years**. There is no bar to others completing this who don't 'qualify', as increased awareness at this level helps to communicate the importance of safeguarding within the church community. The module is a mixture of reading and preparation work, two 'Zoom' sessions, and some review and evaluation work.

All churchwardens need to attend this level of training every three years. New churchwardens need to complete this training, along with the on-line Basic courses, as soon as possible, ideally within three months from appointment. Continuing churchwardens should do this course once they are approaching three years since they completed the former C2 course.

#LiveLent: Embracing Justice is the Church of England's theme for Lent 2022. Both the <u>Archbishop of Canterbury's 2022 Lent Book, *Embracing Justice* (SPCK), and the daily reflections booklet for adults (CHP) have been written by Isabelle Hamley.</u>

It invites us to examine our own lives truthfully, to see the world more deeply and to pray – for the church and the world far and near – that 'justice may roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream' (Amos 5.24).

Each week we follow a different thread through the many stories of justice in the Bible to explore how God works with humanity to bring justice, wholeness and salvation to all. As in recent years, the weekly themes of the Archbishop's Lent Book (supported by online resources for churches and groups) will also be explored in daily reflection from the Church of England.

#LiveLent: Embracing Justice will offer a daily Bible reading, a short reflection, and a prayer, as well as a practical challenge linked to the week's theme. An accompanying child's version will also be available to help children and their families explore how we can live well together.

The book and booklets will be accompanied by daily social media posts from Ash Wednesday (2 March) to Easter Day (17 April), together with a wide range of free digital resources for individuals, groups and churches. www.churchofengland.org/livelent

Annual Parochial Church Meetings and Electoral Roll 2022

Elections of wardens and PCC members should take place by 31st May 2022. This year, electoral rolls should be updated as necessary, but a new roll is not required. Details of what is required of PCC's and the duty of the electoral roll officer can be found at www.derby.anglican.org/en/church-admin/church-information/electoral-roll

This year there is the opportunity to fill any vacant parish places on deanery synod, but current members remain in post until 2023. It is important that any changes to synod members are recorded, and details passed to the deanery and diocese.

There are forms which should be used for both the electoral roll and for those wishing to stand as members of PCC, deanery synod or as church wardens on the Church of England Parish Resources website. Candidates need to fill in a declaration that they are a 'fit and proper person' in respect of financial requirements as trustees under the rules of the Charity Commission. This also applies to fees officers and gift aid secretaries if they are not PCC members. The declaration will also require a statement that the candidate is not barred under the DBS safeguarding rules. Upon appointment all PCC members should undertake an enhanced DBS check if they do not already have one. Please contact Amanda for more information.
