### From the Deanery Team ..

Since our last newsletter the world has been shaken by the events in Ukraine. As a Deanery, we have mobilised our resources through prayer, fundraising, supporting local relief efforts and welcoming refugees. The war has made us ask hard questions and brought home again how small our world is.

I have been privileged to have a link with a local church in Kiev, via social media, and learned about life through the war including the birth of a grandchild and how they have served Christ in these times. I have had glimpses of their worship against the backdrop of air raid warnings, again via social media, recognising familiar tunes to hymns and songs we sing, such as In Christ Alone, As the dear pants for the water and Nearer my God to thee.

I have learnt about Ukrainian history which I knew little of. I have seen and heard of the humanitarian help they have given to now free parts of Ukraine. If you want to look at the Facebook stream search for Maia Mikhaluk on Facebook.

These first hand windows on the war have blessed me with their faith, inspired my prayer and reminded me of how we are part of the body of Christ. In 1 Corinthians 12: 25-26 it says there should be no division in the body, but that its members should have mutual concern for one another. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honoured, every part rejoices with it.

As the war goes on, the need for prayer and aid continues and whilst we think of Ukraine, we need to hold Russia in our prayers too. It is hard for us to imagine some of the perspectives of the Russian people, as we do not live in a place of oppression and we have freedom of the press and access to social media. Please continue to pray for them that they maybe able to see the truth of the war and for peace to prevail for all nations.

I am sure the Deanery will continue to be a blessing to those in need in the coming months.

## **Bishops in solidarity with Ukraine**

The Rt Revd Libby Lane, Bishop of Derby, and the Rt Revd Malcolm Macnaughton, Bishop of Repton, stand with the Archbishops of <u>Canterbury</u> and <u>York</u> in condemning the invasion of Ukraine and calling for prayers for all those affected.

In a joint statement, the archbishops said: "The horrific and unprovoked attack on Ukraine is an act of great evil. "Placing our trust in Jesus Christ, the author of peace, we pray for an urgent ceasefire and a withdrawal of Russian forces. "We call for a public decision to choose the way of peace and an international conference to secure long term agreements for stability and lasting peace."

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#### Report on the March 2022 Derby Diocesan Synod

Nine representatives from our Deanery attended Synod. The chair expressed the hope that this would be the last time Synod met through 'Zoom' as an 'in-person' Synod would be possible in June. One of our representatives commented on the frustration of being at a 'meeting' where there is no person-to person interaction and, effectively, you are just watching an event. It was hoped that members would engage more in the processes of Synod to make them more like a forum than a lecture.

Bishop Libby reflected that sometimes the work of Synod might seem like playing with Titanic's deckchairs when you consider all that is happening around us: fuel poverty, rising COVID infections and the war in Ukraine. But what Synod does is important to the work of the Diocese and, in turn, changing lives, building church and building community. Bishop Libby encouraged everyone to partake in the 2027 Community of prayer. Here is the link <u>Diocesan Community Of Prayer</u>.

We were told that two new Archdeacons had been appointed and an announcement will be made as soon as all the legalities have been sorted. They will start on 6 June. The video that was prepared as part of the recruitment process and which featured two members of our Deanery, was shown to Synod.

In response to a question raised by a member of Synod there was a commitment from the Bishop that the Diocese should be more transparent in its decision making, particularly where that impacted on the wellbeing of clergy and paid staff.

Synod agreed without dissent changes to the Articles of Association of the Diocesan Board of Finance and the Standing Orders of Diocesan Synod to facilitate the creation of three Archdeaconries and to use gender neutral language.

Bishop Malcolm led a discussion about the Church of England initiative: 'Living in Love and Faith'. This is an exploration about how identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage fit within the bigger picture of the good news of Jesus Christ and what it means to live in love and faith together as a Church. Courses have been run in a number of places and feedback is invited to the Church of England by 30 April using the feedback form available on the dedicated website. It was noted that it was still possible to continue running the courses after the 30 April. The feedback received will be considered by the General Synod in the Summer with the hope that a way forwards for the church will be agreed at the Autumn General Synod.

A number of our representatives have reacted back on this part of the agenda. Those reflections highlight the challenges ahead to try to find a way forward that continues to hold all the issues in harmony. Some representatives commented on the hurt that many had felt by our current approach, one was frustrated by the time it was taking to move forward. Another representative felt that we should be considering behaviours, rather than the person: whilst recognising we are all brothers and sisters with Jesus it is the behaviour we should be concerned with. Another concern was around the fact that many already seem to have made up their mind when the current process should only be around listening, understanding and reflecting.

#### Gordon Kirkbride's trip to Windsor

I was very lucky and honoured to be chosen to receive the Royal Maundy money from Prince Charles at Windsor Castle given for my services to the church and scouting community over a number of years. It was a day I will always treasure and remember. A very big thank you to those who nominated me and my daughter for

accompanying me.



We travelled to Windsor on the Wednesday. I was surprised that as we approached the town, it looked like any other suburban town, then it changed into a place with arcades, shopping malls, a station in the heart of the town and all overlooked by the castle. Our hotel was only a short walk to the castle, yet so close to greenery and parks, with the River Thames nearby with many swans being fed. The visitors were very cosmopolitan and also very friendly. Of the many eating places available for our evening meal, we chose Wetherspoons, but at least it was overlooked by the magnificent castle.

I woke early on the Thursday, dressed into my best suit and took another COVID test – fortunately: all clear. From the hotel it was a short walk to join the queue of people waiting to enter the castle. After the police cleared me through the security tests, we transported by buggy to St George's Chapel. We were greeted and escorted to our sets which were very near the entrance giving us an exceptionally good view of all the visitors and dignitaries arriving. The Yeoman of the Guard and other dignitaries were all smartly dressed. The Lord High Almoner told us what would happen during the service.

The Prince of Wales and the Duchess of Cornwall arrived with much pageantry and sat facing the congregation whilst the service took place

The service included 'Praise to the Holiest in the height',' Be Thou my guardian and my guide', 'Praise my soul, the King of heaven' and readings from John 13, 1 to 15 and Matthew 25, 31 to 46. The Prince of Wales then individually spoke to each recipient. He said to me: 'It's good to see you and I present this to you on behalf of the Queen'.

The money was in two purses. A red purse with a £5 coin and a 50p coin specifically designed for the Platinum Jubilee. A white purse containing 4p, 3p, 2p and 1p coins that totalled 96p, in honour of the Queen's age.

After the service we walked to the Great Banqueting Hall in the castle for wine and

refreshments – canapes, to be posh but very small portions! There was pea and mint rice balls, mozzarella pesto squares, Bakewell tartlets, lemon drizzle and simnel cake. Plus, a glass of wine!


These were all served very efficiently whilst we chatted with the other visitors and members of the armed forces. Everyone was very friendly. Talking to an officer from the RAF, I was able to retell my tale of National Service in the RAF and helping make the bobsleigh for the British team in the 1948 Olympics. We also met a couple of ladies on the team that make the posies for the procession, one lady had been making them for 38 years.



At about 2.30pm we were driven back to the castle entrance and wished a safe journey home.

A most memorable day and, again, many thanks to my family for their help in making it possible.





#### Unlocking the Joy of Dino Day

So when the dinosaurs came to Heanor for the Dino Day event, and the 'Teddy Bear leap of faith' that had traditionally taken place at St Lawrence Church on May Day morphed into 'Jurassic Jump' where stuffed dinosaurs roared down a zip wire from the tower to the gate, the Churchwarden Team thought it would be nice to add something more contemplative to the proceedings.

Inside the church were a few activities (colouring, local info, teas etc) and the St Lawrence stand. Here we had some Bible Society Easter booklets for the children to take away, clay plaques and crosses with quotes for the adults, and the main event - the 'Unlocking Joy' activities.

This was the first time I had ever done anything like this - using a faith based resource with the general public and I was unsure how it would be received. What I didn't factor in is how much it would impact on me!

The Unlock resource consisted of two large albums of large format photographs of different

images, cards to be completed, and stickers. The idea being that, after the turbulent few years we have all been through that we would encourage people to stop and think about what brings them Joy in their lives. The albums were there to browse and provide inspiration, the cards were completed and stapled together to form lengths of 'joy' which were then hung from strings, and the stickers for people to write with details of what gave them joy and to wear to start conversations.





What a beautiful day and such lovely conversations came about while I sat at that stall! There was a parent whose child had been asking who Jesus was, a boy who had recently lost his Gran, a woman whose friend had been very ill, a family whose young daughter was so enthralled by this idea of thinking about what brought her joy that she got all the family involved, completed multiple cards and really didn't want to go back to the dinosaurs and free rides outside! And through it all was joy.

I used a very simple opening – 'After the last few years, we're inviting people to think about what brings them joy', and it felt, in many cases, like it was a phrase that unlocked a door and gave people permission to look at the joy around them, even when life has been difficult.

As people looked through the images there were memories of holidays, sports enjoyed, family events, gardens and of loved ones lost, but the quality and range of the images helped the positive memories, the tender, precious, joy filled memories to rise to the surface.

By the end of the day I felt so humbled and so rich - I had had the privilege of sharing in those precious gems, strangers sharing with me moments of richness and beauty; the things that are important to them, the things that have sustained them, and the things that have brought them peace and joy.

I hadn't anticipated how fabulous the day would be!

I hadn't anticipated how much JOY it would bring me!

I couldn't have anticipated how much impact that day would still have on me!


