


From the Area Dean

Recently I visited an exhibition of photography and stories of Ukrainian Refugees by Ukrainian photographer Alona Melnyk and curated by Anastasia at the Ilkon gallery in Ilkeston. It was really powerful. What was poignant was the house keys of the portrait sitters of houses they have had to flee—some with tags showing the house is no longer there, but some with tags that display the belief that one day they will return. I also listened to some of the stories of refugees who are retraining in the UK as engineers and architects so that when they can return they can be part of the rebuilding that will need to happen in the Ukraine.

What struck me amidst the horror of war and destruction was the power of hope; hope that there will be something to return to and that there will be a time to build again.

Lent and Easter are seasons of dashed hopes and hope renewed. The journey to the cross and resurrection is full of people like Peter, a man full of hope but who then denies Jesus and finds his dreams in tatters. The disciples locked in a room full of despair and broken dreams find their hopes met in ways they did not expect, as news of the empty tomb breaches their fear.

The last few years have been and continue to be turbulent as we struggle with reduced income in our churches, with war in Ukraine and cost of living issues. The Church of England is changing as we have fewer clergy to cover parishes. For many, change is unsettling. In all of this let us focus on the God of hope. **Romans 15:13** puts it like this: 'May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope. '

When we step out in faith with God we can find our hope renewed and risk doing new things, explore new ways of church, explore new ways of doing mission and find our faith growing.

A Reader Remembered

Robin Lacey, Licensed Reader in the benefice of Stanton-by-Dale and Dale Abbey with Risley

Robin's life was lived to the full serving his Lord and Saviour, and we were all very sad to hear of his death on Boxing Day,2022. Words from Robins wife, Meryl, remind us of Robin's unwavering Christian faith: "His family and friends take comfort in knowing he has been promoted to glory and is now in heaven with his Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ".

Robin had left quite detailed instructions about his funeral, with the big one being that the funeral was not to be about him, but rather to be about his Lord and Saviour, and indeed it was.

At Stanton-by-Dale, a packed church of family, friends and church family gathered together to say farewell and close Robin's earthly life. Though naturally a sad occasion, it was a service full of thanksgiving, as we gave thanks to God for Robin's wonderful Christian ministry of almost 60 years.

Robin was brought up in Ilkeston and attended St John's Church on Nottingham Road, where he first became a young Churchwarden at the age of 22. Around 1978 Robin and his first wife Pam moved to Stanton-by-Dale Church, where Robin soon again became Churchwarden, and on 6th June 1981, was licensed as a Reader. Sadly, in 1986, his wife Pam died after a brave battle with cancer.

In November 1987, Robin married Meryl, and he continued being very active in Stanton-by-Dale Church as a Churchwarden, Reader, House Group Leader and member of the PCC and Church Leadership Team. 1992 saw another change of church, with Robin, Meryl and their son Nathanael moving to St Peters in Toton, where they stayed for 22 very busy, happy years. There he continued his Reader ministry, and was a Churchwarden, House Group Leader, a member of the PCC and Church Leadership Team.

In 2013, Robin and Meryl returned to St Michael and All Angels Church, Stanton-by-Dale where, once more, Robin quickly became very involved as a Reader, Churchwarden, House Group Leader, and member of the PCC and Church Leadership Team.

At the end of 2021, Robin decided it was time to step down as a Reader, and a few months later in 2022, after being diagnosed with pulmonary fibrosis, he stepped down as Churchwarden. Sadly, over the next 10 months, Robin was admitted to hospital on many occasions with pneumonia and various chest infections, with the last infection leading to his passing on 26 December 2022.

It was a privilege to be a fellow Reader with Robin in our benefice. To me, Robin was a quiet man who took his walk with God very seriously. His sermons often began with the words "now, just stop and imagine for a moment ...", as he encouraged the congregation to picture the scene of what was happening, whilst he elaborated on the details around the bible passage he was speaking about.

The opening words of the final hymn chosen by Robin for his funeral sum up his faith: "In Christ alone my hope is found, He is my light my strength, my song "

New Grant Programme



The Cherish Partnership is a new programme that will provide churches and chapels with practical solutions to improve how their buildings are cared for and secured for the future. This will be delivered through financial support, heritage management skills initiatives and training.

Diocesan Synod Spotlight

Report on the Diocesan Synod of 18th March 2023



Seven of our fourteen representatives attended the latest Diocesan Synod. We do have vacancies both in the House of Clergy and the House of Laity and it would be good to fill them to maximise our contribution to the work of the Synod.

The opening worship was based on a reflection on 'Confidence'

Two students from Derby University who also worship at St Werburgh's [where the Synod was held] spoke about the challenges of maintaining and proclaiming a Christian faith in a university context. It was particularly challenging if one's peer group or flatmates were not sympathetic to your lifestyle or view on secular matters. We were asked to hold in our prayers those with a Christian faith at university and for all students coping with the challenges of mental health and financial concerns.

The key-note speaker was Canon Dr John Spence, Finance Chair of the Archbishops Council. He spoke about the financial challenges of church life but had a clear understanding of what life was like at a local level. He explained that central church funding to Dioceses is now more focussed rather than being a flat grant that ended up propping up the 'status quo'. There were two elements of funding now. One part for the deprived areas of church but expecting specific evidence that the money was being used in those areas. The other element focussed on initiatives that encouraged us to do things to further the Kingdom rather than wallowing in its decline. He spoke about a number of projects across the country where central funds had supported local initiatives to 'do church' in a way that met the needs of the particular community. However, he also acknowledged that there were challenges and the empowerment and training of lay leadership was one of these. Good initiatives involve

Collaboration – working with all possible partners

Urgency

Risk - but well managed

Evidence – use the experience of other schemes to know what works

The hope is that our work will be led by the Spirit but supported by intentional financial backing. All colleagues who have contributed to this summary were impressed with the speaker but recognised the challenge of developing projects that will attract funding.

In her presidential address Bishop Libby spoke about the breadth of her activity in all walks of local and national life. She reminded us of 1 Corinthians 12 which talks about all the different parts, some weak, some strong, all working together and all needing each other to be effective.

Bishop Libby than led a time of reflection in light of the General Synod resolution on Living in Love and Faith. The Bishop recognised that this was a complex and difficult issue and that everyone had a view, whether that was one of welcome or upset that the decision had not gone far enough or had gone too far.

She said that she had voted in favour of the motion and hoped that across the Diocese we can >share in the lament for past actions

>share a witness that shows love for all

>work with a discipline and grace across the various different views.

The Bishop emphasised that

>there will be no change to the church view on marriage

>the draft prayers of blessing are not to be used until they have been refined and commended for use.

>clergy will be completely free to decide whether they use all, some or none of the prayers. She also emphasised that no-one will be disadvantaged by their view on the prayers. All clergy will be supported whatever their view.

Synod members were invited to record their individual thoughts and questions for use only by +Libby and +Malcom.

Comments from our representatives at Diocesan Synod underlined the challenges of the situation created by the decision of General Synod. One commented 'the reality of the disagreements, and what is being proposed, means that it won't be possible to continue to walk together.' Another hoped that a way would be found that made 'walking together' possible.

Somewhat belatedly the arrangements for the coming round of elections to the Deanery Synods were shared. In summary: up to 25 people on the electoral roll: 1 representative; 26 to 75: 2; 76 to 150: 3; 151 to 200: 4; 200+: 5.

The 'Question Time' session continues to air a number of interesting topics although there was no actual debate. In response to our question about the Road Map to Net Zero there was an undertaking to cover the range of environmental issues at the June Synod. Another question from our Deanery concerned understanding how churches can be labelled as 'engaging with children and young people'. Other questions covered: energy costs through the Parish Buying Scheme; how are churches encouraged to be 'Simpler. Humbler, Bolder'; governance of church schools; the Diocesan Academy Trust's policy on schools joining; non-disclosure agreements and 'Living in Love and Faith'.

Present at the Synod will be a "brains trust" panel ready to take your questions. These questions are to be submitted in advance so that answers can be thorough and well considered and therefore of most use.

The substance of the Synod will comprise the questions you generate and the responses from the panel. **No questions = no meaningful discussion!** Therefore we are asking the following:
