About me

58 years old and married to Sarah with two grown-up children aged 18 & 22.

I came to personal faith in Jesus as a teenager and God has faithfully sustained me by His grace ever since. His Spirit continues to lead me, challenge me and change me.

About where I minister

I am the Incumbent of an inner-city multi-ethnic parish, on the south side of Derby City. The local population is 38% Muslim/Sikh, with one mosque directly opposite the church building and another three doors down. The parish is also in the 10% most deprived in the Diocese and the country. The parish is diverse, as is the congregation. In common with 'local church everywhere', we want to be known in the local community and strive to do what we can to serve its needs in the name of Jesus. About the Church of England

We have the amazing privilege of proclaiming Christ afresh everywhere in every generation. I believe the traditional parish system has been a gift of God to England and the principles of covering the entire country and the cure of all souls are worth working to preserve. However, it has limitations in twenty-first century England so a mixed economy of different styles of churches, both neighbourhood and network, for different settings is necessary and we must make them work. We should widely encourage initiatives such as those in *Mission Shaped Church* and instruments such as Bishop's Mission Orders. As the church's national parliament, the General Synod is there to support and enable the work of local churches all over the country; it sets the tone and context for all of our work and we hope and pray it might provide the lead that the whole church needs.

About the pandemic

The world and the church have experienced a severe shaking in the last eighteen months and true healing and recovery has barely started. For many it has been an incredibly difficult time - certainly in my church and local community – but the balm of 'Christ with us' has been an immense comfort and strength. I have been struck again by how vital and urgent it is for the church to remember and hold out the Christian hope in a fallen and hurting world.

About my thinking

In an ever-changing world I am drawn to John Stott's idea of "double listening": "We listen to the Word with humble reverence, anxious to understand it, and resolved to believe and obey what we come to understand. We listen to the world with crucial alertness, anxious to understand it too, and resolved not necessarily to believe and obey it, but to sympathise with it and to seek grace to discover how the gospel relates to it." [The Contemporary Christian pg 28]. I have much to learn but, were I to be elected, I would endeavour to employ double listening in all of Synod's business not least in consideration of the Living in Love and Faith project.

About what the Lord has taught me in ministry

Spiritual growth is granted as the Lord wills. The role of the pastor and teacher who gently shepherds the flock of the Lord's people is crucial in any context, whether town, countryside or city. It is a privilege to be amongst those called to this task and we need many more: cutting clergy numbers is not the answer.

When big stresses and griefs have threatened our family, I have known the blessing of dependence on God in my immense weakness; gained a fresh insight into the wonder, complexity and fragility of humanity and felt the deep joy of seeing our church family looking out for the vulnerable, welcoming and including all.

Having become a Christian in my youth, I am committed to mission and ministry to all ages and feel a burden to serve children and young people in state schools in addition to our CofE schools.

I thank God for the blessing of racial and social diversity and, ministering here in this area, I look forward to the perfect, heavenly church gathered from every nation, tribe and tongue around the throne of Jesus. I rejoice in the vibrant influence of the wider Anglican Communion and the benefits of our partnership in mission internationally. I am painfully aware of the serious failings in the current Clergy Discipline Measure. Wholesale reform of the way in which both clergy and lay discipline is upheld is surely long overdue? ...for the sake of the whole body of Christ and God's glory.
