

From the acting Archdeacon

Welcome to this profile for three churches that share not only the same tradition but also a compelling vision for mission in their communities.

St Peter's, Calow, has been a story of quiet but meaningful growth over the past four years. The congregation has increased steadily, with strong connections to their Church school – truly the "jewel in the crown" of their ministry. Their thriving community groups, regular fellowship activities, and warm welcome make this a parish with solid foundations.



St Paul's, Hasland serves a diverse parish with areas of new housing alongside established communities. While they have faced challenges in recent years, there's tremendous potential here with their beautiful, light-filled church space and dedicated congregation. The church's central role in the community is evident through its care home ministry, food bank collections, and charitable partnerships.

St James, Temple Normanton, held in plurality with Hasland, has faithfully maintained its ministry in a small parish setting and is now discerning its future path.

The strengths across these parishes are significant – committed lay leadership, traditional Anglo-Catholic worship that nourishes the congregation's faith, and genuine community connections. But there are also meaningful opportunities for development, particularly in school relationships, ministry to young families, and collaborative mission across the three communities.

The parishes face common challenges – ageing congregations, the need for building repairs (particularly at Hasland and Calow), and financial pressures that have affected Common Fund contributions. Yet in each community, there's remarkable resilience and readiness to embrace a renewed vision under fresh priestly leadership.

We're looking for someone who will be pastorally attentive while also missionally creative – working collaboratively with committed lay people to develop a cohesive vision while honouring each church's distinct identity. The foundations for this already exist, with joint confirmation services, shared pilgrimages, and mutual support already happening naturally.

Mission Action Planning will be key to building on these foundations, helping these communities to articulate where God is calling them next.

Hasland, Calow, and Temple Normanton PCCs have passed resolutions and are under the wextended episcopal care of the Bishop of Oswestry.

We look forward to hearing from you and welcome any conversations that might help you discern if God is calling you to this rich and rewarding ministry.

- Is a good listener who is approachable by people of all faiths and none.
- Will lead our discipleship and help us grow in prayer, Bible study, and pastoral care.
- Brings warmth, humour, and humanity to ministry.
- Can lead worship through music.
- Recognises their own strengths and weaknesses, building up the gifts within the church family.
- Will take a collaborative approach, working closely with parishioners to reach out to the community.



This benefice spans three neighbouring parishes on the south eastern edge of the Peak District, each with a distinct character and shared strengths in community life, good transport links, and proximity to Chesterfield's services and employment. Together they offer a mix of village, suburban, and semi-rural settings, with growing families alongside long-standing residents, and opportunities for ministry in schools, care homes, and community hubs.

Calow

- A growing rural village of around 3,000 people within North East Derbyshire District, about 2 miles east of Chesterfield and close to M1 junctions 29 and 29a.
- Strong educational links. Calow Church of England (VC) Primary School is situated at the heart of the village, serving approximately 180 pupils. Secondary education is accessed in Chesterfield, Bolsover, and Staveley.
- Significant healthcare presence. The Chesterfield and North Derbyshire Royal Hospital complex is situated adjacent to the parish, off the A632, and is the largest local employer, drawing staff and visitors from across the region.
- Services for all ages. Several care homes, a sheltered housing complex, a GP surgery and pharmacy, two public houses, hairdressers, a fish and chip shop, a nursery, and other small shops serve local needs.
- Active community use of space. The centrally located Community Centre hosts daily classes, clubs, and a thriving playgroup.
- Housing mix. Predominantly owner-occupied with interspersed council-owned and privately rented homes. A large new housing development is underway, indicating continued growth and opportunities for welcome and outreach.



Hasland (including Grassmoor, Winsick, and Corbriggs)

- A diverse parish of 11,026 people (2021 Census) comprising areas that are rural, suburban, and village-like in feel, with new housing alongside established neighbourhoods and visible traces of the area's industrial heritage.
- The parish church sits to the south of the central community area, noted for its village character.
- Mixed deprivation context. A deprivation rank of 2,915 on a scale where 1 is the most deprived and 12,161 is the least deprived highlights both need and resilience, as well as the scope for practical pastoral presence.
- Excellent connectivity. Around 10 minutes to the M1, 20 minutes to Sheffield, 40 minutes to Derby. Regular bus services and Chesterfield station on the Midland Main Line provide wider links.
- Established care home ministry. Three local homes Bank Close House, The Green Nursing Home, and Heather Vale offer regular worship and communion services.
- Community facilities and partnerships. A well-kept park with a village hall hosts the annual Christmas fair and Remembrance service at the war memorial. The centre offers shops, wellbeing services, hairdressers, eateries, and pubs. Churches Together maintains relationships with the local Methodist and Baptist churches, supporting shared events such as the World Day of Prayer, the Christmas Tree Festival, and Messy Church.





Temple Normanton

- A smaller semi-rural parish east of Chesterfield with a traditional village core and newer development at its edges.
- Community identity shaped by village life, commuter links, and nearby employment in and around Chesterfield and along the M1 corridor.
- Housing includes long-standing family homes and newer estates, with a mix of owner occupation and rented accommodation.
- Ministry opportunities typically centre on close-knit neighbourhood networks, mission to growing house holds, pastoral support for older residents, and collaboration with nearby schools.
- Proximity to open countryside supports outdoor family life and seasonal community activities, with scope for fresh expressions and creation care initiatives.

Chesterfield and the Peak District

- All three parishes sit within a few miles of Chesterfield, a historic market town centred on St Mary and All Saints (the Crooked Spire), offering extensive amenities including a mainline railway station, theatres, cinema, museum, sports centre and pool, gyms, and a wide range of shops and restaurants.
- The Peak District National Park lies less than a 15-minute drive away, giving easy access to walking, cycling, and outdoor recreation that enriches family and community life.
- The M1 provides rapid regional connections for work and study, supporting a resident population that blends local roots with incoming families and professionals.

Our three parishes work closely with local schools, early years settings, uniformed organisations, care homes, and community hubs. This creates regular, relational points of contact across ages and settings, and opens practical pathways for pastoral care, worship, and mission.

Calow

Calow Church of England (VC) Primary School

- Strong and active partnership with the church.
- One churchwarden serves as Chair of Governors, with two Foundation Governors on the governing body.
- Fr Steven Tricklebank (retired priest) is a Foundation Governor, leads collective worship, and visits weekly to hear children read.

Shared worship and events include:

- · Joint Christingle.
- School services in church at Harvest, Christmas, and Easter with parents and carers attending.
- Mutual support at community events: church stalls at school fairs; PTFA support for church garden parties and autumn fairs.
- The congregation is invited to the school's community lunches twice a year.

Early years

- Sunnybank Nursery supports the church's Harvest Festival with foodbank collections.
- At Christmas, children present a Nativity in church for parents and families.

Uniformed organisations and youth

- 1st Calow, St Peter's Scout Group (Beavers, Cubs, Scouts) meets weekly in the church hall.
- Participation in Mothering Sunday and the Remembrance Service and parade to the Cenotaph, including readings and intercessions.
- Aspiration to widen their involvement in regular worship.

Community services and spaces

- Church meeting room hosts Knit and Natter, coffee mornings, parish lunches, and Lent lunches.
- Church hall (with adjacent field) is used for larger events and is available for public hire.
- Grant received for Warm Spaces provision has underpinned hospitality and welcome.
- Regular stalls at village and school events, plus festival and autumn fairs, deepen community ties.

Care and pastoral

- · Regular home communions are offered.
- Developing plans include monthly visits to the local care home, Messy Church, and a monthly Dads-and-Children group in the hall.



Hasland

(including Grassmoor, Winsick, and Corbriggs)

Schools

- Four schools within the parish: Hasland Infant, Hasland Junior, Outwood Academy Hasland Hall, and Grassmoor Primary.
- There are currently no formal links; the parish is keen to build relationships with leadership, chaplaincy presence in assemblies, RE support, and seasonal services, and to explore re introducing a Sunday School and family services as natural bridges.

Community engagement

- Strong participation in local events, including the Festival of Christmas Trees at Hasland Methodist Church, the village Gala, Christmas carols outside shops, and the Remembrance service at the war memorial in the park.
- Regular, well-attended socials such as coffee mornings, concerts, and fairs foster welcome and belonging.
- Church open daily for private prayer, with prayer cards, votive candles, and a quiet corner signposting the church's pastoral availability.

Care homes

- A small lay team offers services of song, prayer, and readings four times a year across three local care homes. These are well-received by residents and staff.
- The parish aims to sustain and, where possible, expand this pattern, including communion as appropriate.

Uniformed and community groups

 Desire to grow engagement with Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, Beavers, Cubs, and Scouts through family-focused worship and occasional services for young people, particularly in Grassmoor, where the location can aid in reach.

Social action and communications

- Monthly collections for the Clay Cross Food Bank.
- Support for external charities, including Mary's Meals and Saltergate Children's Home Ethiopia.
- Emerging use of social media and a parish website to communicate services and community opportunities.

Temple Normanton

School

- Temple Normanton Primary Academy is a non-church primary school with 106 pupils.
- The school visits Church for curriculum coverage and festivals.
- There are strong links with the school and church visits the school each term.

Community facilities

- The village has a recreation field with recently installed outdoor gym equipment.
- There is a community woodland/meadow open-space project in partnership with the school and playgroup.
- Temple Normanton has no shops, but there is a cemetery and an MOT garage in the village.
- · Grassmoor Country Park is nearby.





Calow — St Peter's

St Peter's is a welcoming, traditional Anglo Catholic parish where the Sung Mass is central to worship. Vestments and incense are used on Sundays and Feast Days, with a regular serving team of MC, thurifer, and two acolytes. Music is led by a "music box" in the absence of a regular organist. The Sunday congregation averages 30–35, spanning ages 10 to 90+, and attendance has grown over the last three years.

The parish is well-organised, with all statutory officers in place and a committed PCC comprising officers and five elected members, who meet bi-monthly. Agendas and minutes are circulated in advance, and meetings are well attended. The electoral roll stands at 32 (10 resident, 22 non resident). Hospitality and welcome are strong: sides teams greet at the door and the congregation stays for coffee and conversation after Mass.

The worshipping life follows the church year with well-kept liturgies for Lent, Holy Week and Easter, Patronal Festival, Harvest, All Souls, Remembrance, and Christmas. There is an active life events ministry, regular home communions, and established ties with the village through school services, uniformed organisations, and community events. Parish social life includes coffee mornings, parish lunches, a Knit & Natter group, seasonal fairs, and outreach at local events. The church hall hosts Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, and a weekly wood carving group.

Calow values collaboration with neighbouring parishes and is open to occasional joint services while maintaining its own identity and pattern of worship.



Hasland — St Paul's

St Paul's is a modern Anglo-Catholic church with a diverse and welcoming congregation and strong lay participation. Incense and vestments are integral to worship. The principal Sunday Sung Mass averages around 40, with a midweek Low Mass of about 10. The church is open daily in daylight hours for private prayer, with a quiet corner, votive candles, and take-home prayer cards.

While there is currently no Sunday School, several young families attend regularly, and the parish hopes to reintroduce a monthly family service and healing services.

Governance and practical ministries are robust: a proactive PCC meets at least eight times a year; there are servers, Eucharistic ministers, readers, intercessors, sacristy support, a verger, and welcome stewards. Social and fundraising life is lively, with a social committee running coffee mornings, concerts, suppers, a Christmas fair, and a monthly Church Lottery. The congregation engages the wider community through the Festival of Christmas Trees at Hasland Methodist Church, the village Gala, Christmas carols outside shops, Remembrance in the park, and regular support for the Clay Cross Food Bank and overseas charities.

Pastoral outreach includes quarterly worship in three local care homes, collaboration with Methodist and Baptist neighbours on the World Day of Prayer, and an openness to renewed children's and youth engagement, including links with Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, Beavers, Cubs, and Scouts. With no church hall and a site outside the village centre, St Paul's is intentionally exploring a creative, location-flexible mission, particularly in Grassmoor.



Temple Normanton

Temple Normanton is a smaller, semi-rural worshipping community long associated in plurality with St Paul's Hasland and supportive of shared ministry and mutual encouragement. The parish values close knit relationships, seasonal worship, and collaboration with neighbouring churches for special occasions. Given its scale and proximity to larger centres, Temple Normanton looks to host occasional family friendly and seasonal services locally, in addition to weekly Mass.

Vestments are worn and incense is used during the Mass. PCC meetings are held bi-monthly.

Mission & Ministry Activities

Across the three churches, ministry is centred on Eucharistic worship, generous welcome, and strong lay participation. We're prioritising pastoral presence, children and families, and visible community engagement, with shared seasonal liturgies used to gather the widest participation.

Hospitality and fellowship

- Calow: Coffee after Mass, Coffee Mornings, Parish Lunch, Knit & Natter, Lent Lunches.
- Hasland: Coffee mornings, concerts and socials, monthly 100 club touchpoint.
- Temple Normanton: Simple hospitality around Sunday Mass as capacity allows. Monthly Parish Breakfast, Coffee Mornings, Beetle Drives. Versatile Church buildings, Hiring Agreement in place.

Children, families, and schools

- Calow: Deep partnership with Calow C of E VC Primary and Sunnybank Nursery.
- Hasland: Develop school links, reintroduce a monthly Family Service and explore Sunday School relaunch.
- Temple Normanton: Termly visits to school. School visits Church for curriculum coverage and festivals.

Young people and uniformed organisations

- Calow: Beavers, Cubs, Scouts use the hall and serve on Mothering Sunday and Remembrance.
- Hasland: Reconnect with Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, Beavers, Cubs and Scouts via family services and youth specific liturgies.

Compassion and community presence

- · Foodbank support, Harvest giving, Warm Spaces (Calow) and targeted winter hospitality.
- Ecumenical and civic witness: Remembrance, World Day of Prayer, village gala, street carols, Festival of Christmas Trees.
- Pastoral care: Home communions and visiting during illness and bereavement, plus care home services (Hasland).
- Temple Normanton: Collection of items for Clay Cross Food Bank on the first Sunday of each month.

Festivals and evangelism

- Calow: Patronal, Harvest, All Souls/All Saints memorial tea, Christmas Eve Crib & Carols.
- · Hasland: All Souls Requiem, Holy Week devotionals, carol services.
- Temple Normanton: Seasonal pattern with Holy Week and Christmas.

Future focus: Deliver family-friendly worship across the benefice, reintroduce Healing Services at Hasland, grow school links (starting with one pilot at Hasland and achieving termly milestones), increase uniformed group involvement at Calow, and tighten invitations and follow-up around baptisms and festivals.

Ministry Team

There is an engaged and committed team of clergy with Permission to Officiate covering services across the three churches, including officiating at funeral rites where required.

Finance

Our finances are managed independently by each church, with committed treasurers and PCCs who regularly review financial positions.

St Peter's, Calow has historically met its Parish Share obligations in full until recent years, when building maintenance needs (particularly the £34,000 spire repair project) necessitated a reduced contribution of £8,000 against the requested £17,569. The congregation actively fundraises through various social events and has accumulated £10,000 toward the spire repairs while seeking grants for the remaining amount.

St Paul's, Hasland maintains relatively healthy finances, consistently paying its Common Fund in full until January 2025, when it temporarily reduced payments to 50% while addressing Quinquennial inspection issues. The church aims to return to full payment of its £35,274 request as soon as possible.

St James', Temple Normanton has seen fluctuations in both income and Parish Share payments over the past decade. With a small but committed base of planned givers (currently 5), the church contributed £2,640 toward Parish Share in 2024, down from £7,620 in 2023. The church maintains reserves of £3,060.86 and restricted funds of £5,538.00.

Across all three churches, we recognize the financial challenges ahead and are committed to developing sustainable giving patterns and creative fundraising approaches as we move forward together.




Vicarage





Finance Dashboard for the Parish of Calow: St Peter in the Deanery of North East Derbyshire

















Weekly average planned giving per planned giver (2024)





Finance Dashboard for the Parish of Hasland: St Paul in the Deanery of North East Derbyshire

















Weekly average planned giving per planned giver (2024)





Finance Dashboard for the Parish of Temple Normanton: St James The Apostle in the Deanery of North East Derbyshire

















Weekly average planned giving per planned giver (2024)




