Getting to know and starting to work with the neighbouring Parishes (St. Augustine's, Chesterfield and St. John's, Walton in particular) will be a key to success here, looking for what could be done better together, and the existing church community has much to bring to that as you will discover as you read on.

This is a half time post, and the role has enormous potential for someone with vision, a heart for people and an ability to engage strategically with all that is already here along with exciting new opportunities, to see God's Kingdom come.

- A beautiful, versatile, well used and modern church building.
- A large adjacent Rectory.
- A modern well-used church centre, complete with large car park.
- A welcoming congregation and PCC.

The opportunities in our parish

- A supportive and faithful congregation who engage and help in worship and mission.
- We are blessed with a beautiful building that can be used in many different ways, and active and dedicated people with good networks within the village who are involved in church and village life.
- The church centre is a major asset providing an excellent facility for both the congregation and many local organisations.
- The church is usually open for private prayer during daylight hours, and both the church and churchyard are attractive and well maintained.

- Our church music, which is traditional and of high quality, is further complemented by good acoustics.
- A fast-growing village with two existing primary schools and a new one, "The Avenue" Church of England Primary School (part of the Derby Diocese Academy Trust) due to be built in the near future.
- Neighbouring Parishes we would like to get to know better in order to explore areas where we might work together.
- A safe and pleasant area to live and thrive.

The challenges in our parish

- Through our mission work in the community and our fundraising events we attract and make welcome new people into church. However, although young families join us to help develop their faith and involvement it is to Messy Church and Kids Stuff and not to the Family Services. We currently have fifty-three children on the Messy Church register and sixteen children who regularly attend Kids Stuff.
- We have identified that there are parts of the village with no church representation. It would be our vision to try and encourage the residents in those areas to become involved in the life of Christ's church. We need a strong leader to take us forward in that vision and to work with us to revisit our Mission Action Plan.
- We need an effective pastoral team to enable us to minister to a growing and ageing population.

Our identity as a worshipping community

The church sits mid-way in the tradition of the Church of England, catering for a mixed congregation ranging from those on the liberal end of the spectrum to those from a more 'high church' background; vestments are usually worn, and the liturgy can be either spoken or sung. The Eucharist is celebrated according to Common Worship Order One in modern language and the ritual is relaxed and modern. The seasons of the liturgical year are marked in all of their glory – and the services of Holy Week and the Triduum are celebrated in full. For the past few years we have also engaged with the national "Thy Kingdom Come" prayer initiative. The sacrament is reserved in church. Whilst the tradition of All

Saints is firmly eucharistic, it is truly catholic in the all-embracing sense, with openness and understanding, as people come to encounter God in word and sacrament.

We have a 9:30am Family Eucharist on the third Sunday of each month which is an inclusive and family orientated liturgy. Currently there are two children and their parents who attend this service in addition to the usual congregation. We are actively exploring new ways to encourage families to join us. We hope and believe that this can be developed.

<u>Prayer</u>

At the first service of each month we distribute small prayer cards to all the members of the congregation, and they are asked to write down the names of anyone known by them to be sick or otherwise in need of prayer. At the end of the service these are collected and the following day a small Prayer Group meet to offer prayers on all their behalf.

<u>Weddings</u>

Over the years the number of weddings has decreased, however, we have shared the pleasure of performing the ceremony for two couples in 2023. We encourage and welcome couples to join us for the services when their banns are read.

<u>Baptisms</u>

With the support of a dedicated Baptism Officer the church baptised 12 children during 2023. The services are always well attended, and all are welcomed.

Funerals, burials and internment of ashes.

We take funeral services to those living in the parish when required and many ashes are scattered in our Garden of Remembrance. Our Reader often performs the service, spending time with grieving relatives in order to give a professional and caring service. In 2023 we held 9 funerals with 7 burials in the churchyard, 1 memorial service and 7 services to scatter ashes in the Garden of Remembrance.

Our Mission with families, children and schools

The congregation and leaders are always involved in Mission Work in whatever from. Although fund raising is important to maintain the church and church centre, at the forefront of this is our Mission Work. We see it as an opportunity for the church to be at the heart of the community, where we can share the church and engage with others. We showcase the churches children's activities and promote the groups available for them.

The monthly community Café is very popular. Our mission work through this event involves the wider community and provides a welcoming Christian based environment.

At the Christmas Tree Festival all the church groups, businesses in the village and other groups who meet in Wingerworth are invited to decorate a tree and present information about their group/business and how to contact them. We see this as the most well attended event in the calendar and gives us a wonderful opportunity to engage with visitors who are seeing the church at its best. This event is open to the Parish as a whole and is well supported within the village.

"Messy Church"

There is also a popular and well-run Messy Church group that is held on a Saturday afternoon once a month. Parents and children enjoy time together, participate in activities, share a meal, and finally a short act of worship. They enjoy the welcome and spiritual care from church leaders and see messy as "their" church.

<u>"Kids Stuff"</u>

This is a weekly/term time after-School club which caters for primary school children, where they enjoy games, activities, a simple act of worship and a hot meal and a dessert.

"First Steps"

Is a group for Carer and Toddlers which is held just after school starting time and allows carers to gather socially whilst children play with the many provided toys. The session ends with a bible story and prayers. This group of people value the work the leaders do and have asked to continue meeting throughout the year.

" Schools Work"

The two primary schools, Deer Park Primary, (deerpark.derbyshire.sch.uk) and Hunloke Park Primary (hunlokepark.derbyshire.sch.uk), have excellent reputations. We have positive relationships with both schools and encourage visits. We have developed quiet days for year 6 pupils from both schools to help them transition from Junior to Senior schools. Also throughout the primary school years we encourage visits from all year groups to experience aspects of church life and the roles performed by church personnel.



The church also has a mausoleum of some historical note; the church having in the past been closely connected to the once adjacent Wingerworth Hall owned by the Hunloke Family. The mausoleum was built as a burial chamber for family members. It has recently been renovated and now houses a largescale model of the Hall. School children love looking at this part of the church and are interested in its history.

All the groups mentioned are church run and popular with local families. The link between these, particularly Messy Church, Baptisms, and the Family

Eucharist, coupled with the existing school's links and the new church school to come obviously provides a massive opportunity which is ripe for development

The Ministry Team

The ministry team consists of the Priest-in-Charge and a Lay Reader, and we can call upon a retired Minister with P.T.O. who lives in the village to assist. Worship is led by, and is the responsibility of, the Priest-in-Charge. Members from our church community and others also assist with readings, intercessions, administration of the chalice and altar serving.

Sung services are accompanied by a small, robed adult choir and led by a talented organist and choirmaster. Their numbers are often augmented at special services.

There are currently one hundred people on the electoral roll, most of whom reside in the parish.

Our community

Wingerworth is a large semi-rural village, three miles south of Chesterfield on the A61, and within easy reach of the Peak District. There are currently around 7,350 residents, which has increased by approximately a third with the building of new housing estates on the eastern edge of the village.

The village has good amenities which include the Parish Hall and library, two primary schools, Wingerworth Medical Centre, and a Pharmacy in the same building. There are three pubs, an independent chapel, two small shopping areas, a park, and several recreation areas.

It is a thriving village with many clubs and activities which include a horticultural society, men's sheds group and several keep-fit classes. There is a Women's Institute, Townswomen's Guild, a weekly Ladies Club, and an Art Club.

There are carer and toddler groups and a nursery with before and after-school facilities in addition to the church-run ones mentioned above.

Sports facilities in the village are available for both children and adults and include football, tennis, table-tennis, a bowling green, and a cricket pitch.

The uniformed organisations are closely linked with the church and the Scouts hut is located within the church grounds. We would like to further develop these links with the support of a new Priest-in-Charge.

Wingerworth is served by The Chesterfield Royal Hospital, a 500-bed district general hospital facility with Trust status about four miles away.

The church and its buildings



The original church dates from the 12th Century.

It was substantially extended in the 1960's creating the beautiful building we have today. The old and the new complement each other wonderfully.





The Lady Chapel, in the oldest part of the church, will seat approximately twenty-four in the older pews and is used for smaller acts of worship such as the Sunday 8:00 am Said Eucharist, and for private prayer. There is a sacristy and a good-sized choir vestry which is often used for group meetings.

The bell tower houses a peal of five bells, and there is an enthusiastic ringing team who ring regularly on Sunday mornings and for weddings. The bell is tolled for funerals. The ringing chamber has recently been refurbished and welcomes visiting ringers. The ringing team observe national occasions such as the Platinum Jubilee celebrations.

The church building is in good condition. Funds are allocated each year for ongoing maintenance over a five-year cycle.

The Snetzler-based organ, which dates from 1754, has been at All Saints since 1980 and was restored a decade ago.

The previous incumbent had established the "20-20 Vision Group", a working group to look at how the church might be re-ordered. The newer part of the church now has 150 new chairs with a few remaining pews at the back of the church.

This gives greater flexibility as the chairs can be stacked away leaving a large space which we have used for Autumn and Spring craft fairs to raise funds. We have been able to encourage families to bring their children by offering all age craft workshops and activities. These fairs have presented us with many opportunities to engage in conversations with visitors and talk about what the church, as the heart of the community, has to offer. Through this mission work we have had many new families joining us at Messy Church.

The church, with its beautiful stained-glass windows and a big open space, presents an exciting blank canvas for a new incumbent with vision.

The Churchyard

The well-kept open churchyard includes a Garden of Remembrance. Its upkeep is the responsibility of the churchyard committee, with a grant awarded from Wingerworth Parish Council towards the grass cutting by an external contractor. The area is well lit to allow access to both the church and the adjacent church centre.

The Church Centre



The church centre was opened in 1997 and is well used by the church, for social events, and by church groups such as the Mothers' Union. Run by a paid, parttime, Administrator assisted by a volunteer team, the centre is also hired out virtually every day to a variety of community groups, which has enabled it to operate without imposing a financial burden on the church in past years. After Covid19 the hiring of the centre did not recover well and raising funds to keep it open is challenging and ongoing.

Within the centre there is a large hall with an adjacent lounge area; a parish office; two further upstairs meeting rooms; and a fully operational kitchen.

The Rectory



Located within the church grounds is an attractive and well maintained fourbedroomed 1960's family house with attached garage and a medium size garden which is mainly lawn. The property is highly suitable for a family with children and is directly opposite Hunloke Park Primary school.

Parish finances

The church's financial affairs show a not-untypical mixed picture. Annual income is averaging about £80,000, but over recent years, whilst appeals for specific projects have attracted a strong response, it has been harder to generate sufficient income to cover the normal work of our church and meet the request from the Diocesan Common Fund. As a result, our Common Fund has not been paid in full for over 5 years; in 2023 we contributed £36,000 against a requested £50,500. (See Appendix for summary of accounts for year ending 31st December 2023)

Reserves for fabric repairs should be sufficient to cover currently anticipated work highlighted by a recent quinquennial inspection (December 2021).

Full ministry working expenses are paid from church funds including telephone, travel and office expenses. The Rectory water rates are also paid.

Six percent of annual planned giving (including tax refunds) is donated to charity. Further donations are made through fundraising for specific charities such as The Children's Society.

We readily respond to local or national emergencies.

We also operate a scheme where 'Patrons' pay the running costs of the church for a day, or days, on date which are particularly significant to them.

A major fundraising event is the annual Christmas Tree Festival where local groups are invited to decorate a sponsored tree. The church is open during the day and refreshments are served in the church centre. There are activities for children and an opportunity to meet Santa and Mrs Claus. The Autumn and Spring Fairs, a Brick Festival (Lego models) and a monthly Saturday morning community café are also well attended fund-raising events.

Other aspects of church life.

- Advent/Lent groups run by incumbent and/or the Reader.
- Weekly craft session an all-inclusive drop-in group regularly attracting 15-30 people, who bring a craft such as knitting, card making etc. to enjoy in a friendly, informal social session.
- Mothers' Union a growing group who are active in Christian family care and help many local and national charities as part of their ministry.
- Solo Group a group for people who have been recently bereaved, where they can gather together for mutual support and meals out, theatre visits and short holidays.
- Harvest Supper followed by social entertainment.
- The Christmas Tree Festival and Christmas Fair as detailed above.
- Parish Lunch Tuesdays each month open to church members and those who wish to join in as a way of dealing with loneliness.
- "All Saints Pantry," where once a month, after the 9:30am service, a stall at the back of Church sells bread, cakes and craft items made and donated by members of the congregation to boost Church funds.
- Community Café a monthly coffee morning held in the church centre on the fourth Saturday of the month to raise funds for the church and centre.
