There are two Chellastons in reality. There's the established village centre with all the amenities and community structures of a thriving village. There's also the major new housing area which, already substantial, continues to grow at pace. The post of Priest in Charge of Chellaston covers both contexts and offers a unique opportunity to develop new worshipping communities within the new housing context whilst calling out the gifting of the inherited church community at the centre of the village.

This is a church where gifted and committed laity are already responding missionally to the opportunities of new housing. Members of St Peter's Chellaston have taken part in diocesan training for church teams wanting to reach out to new housing contexts. Pop-up church has now become an established presence within the new housing developments and offers real opportunity to the next Priest in Charge to develop further.

There are already three primary schools, with a fourth due in 2025, and a secondary school. Chellaston presents a missional priest committed to a mixed ecology of inherited church alongside new worshipping communities with a wonderful opportunity for mission. To succeed in this role you don't have to be designated a pioneer but you do need to embrace pioneering ministry.

The Diocese of Derby takes the wellbeing of its clergy seriously. The new priest will join an active and supportive deanery chapter led by the Area and two Assistant Area Deans. There is an annual clergy conference alongside annual retreat and training grants.

Led by the Bishop's Leadership Team, the diocese has been developing an exciting and focused strategic plan, to fulfil its vision of the Kingdom of God: Good News for all. The appointed priest will join us at the start of that strategy coming to fruition in diocesan life.

As archdeacon, I welcome requests for informal conversations about this role and look forward to welcoming the appointed priest to the archdeaconry and diocese. Thank you for taking the time to read, reflect and pray through this profile. I recognise that any potential move is a costly discernment process and want to assure you of my prayers as you discern whether this is the right role for you.

Chellaston is situated on the southern edge of Derby City Deanery within the Diocese of Derby and has a population of circa 16,000 as of the 2021 census. There are mentions of Chellaston from as early as 1009, with the village slowly growing over the centuries. Chellaston was once one of the largest producers of mined alabaster in the United Kingdom, with the Alabaster from the parish being used to form Nottingham Alabaster.

Chellaston is a mainly residential area, with a mix of traditional and modern housing. More recently, the village has been regenerated, with a number of new housing estates being built around the edges of the original village. Significant additional housing is currently being built, with circa 3000 additional houses expected to be completed over the coming ten years. The continuing urban development will most likely lead to Chellaston's parish boundaries being re-drawn in the near future, with the potential for the suburb population to grow to in excess of 25,000.

In addition to St. Peter's church there is a Methodist Church within the parish, and an active Churches Together in Chellaston initiative. Until recently, there was also St. Ralph Sherwin's Catholic church in the parish, whilst the congregation are still active the building was recently demolished.

The parish is served by two GP practices, three pharmacies and a dental practice. Chellaston has several supermarkets within the parish, and a range of independent local shops including a butcher's, Post Office, car garage, funeral directors, multiple take away restaurants, various hairdressing salons and three public houses. There is also a single working farm within the parish.

There is a Community Centre in the heart of the parish which is used by various community groups. A new community space – The Crossbar - has opened at the eastern edge of the suburb to run several sports clubs and a café, and St. Peter's also has a church hall building that may be used by the community. The Filbert Walk Community Rooms runs a Baby & Toddler Group (Mon), baby classes (Tues), a coffee morning and lunch (Sat). Within Chellaston there is an active Baden-Powell movement. The units take part in the annual Remembrance Sunday Service, and attend an annual Baden-Powell Carol Service in Church each December.

There are a number of active membership groups within Chellaston, including the Chellaston Players Amateur Dramatics Society who rehearse and perform in the Church Hall, a Community Choir that participate in the Remembrance Sunday service and other ad hoc services and events throughout the year, a History Group and the Women's Institute.

Local publications include Chellaston Choice magazine and the Facebook page Spotted Chellaston, both of which are used for communication when appropriate by St Peter's.





Within the parish boundary there are four primary schools;

As part of the ongoing housing developments there will be a further primary school built (Infinity Park Spencer Academy due to open in 2025), and Chellaston Academy may be developed further to support the growing needs of the parish.

None of the schools are directly affiliated to St. Peter's Church, however the church has an active presence in all of the schools within the parish. "Tell me a story" (ecumenical) is run weekly at Chellaston Infants School, and the previous vicar delivered regular assemblies at Chellaston Infants School. All primary schools have visited the church recently to support their ongoing curriculum.

There are also multiple private day nurseries within the parish:

St. Peter's Church dates from at least the 13th century when mention of a gift "a gift by Alexander formerly Bishop of Coventry and Lichfield to Walter, Bishop of Karliol [Carlisle] of the church of Meleburn with its chapels of Chelardeston and Neuton" is made of it in a document in the Cumbrian County Record Office.

The responsibility for the church at Chellaston stayed with Melbourne until the late 19th century when the Reverend Joseph Hughes became the first resident incumbent at St Peter's, Chellaston, previously a curate had looked after the church. In 1842 a tower was built on the west side of the church.

St. Peter's operates with a Parochial Church Council (PCC). The PCC delegates authority to a number of sub-groups to discuss and propose recommendations to the PCC on specific matters. The sub-groups comprise:

- · Ministry Group; including pastoral care
- Worship Group
- Fabric Group
- · Church Hall Group
- Communications Group
- · Green Group; working towards Bronze Eco Church status

The use of sub-groups allows the PCC to seek engagement from subject matter experts that are not part of the PCC as and when required. This enables the best quality proposals to be brought back to the PCC to be endorsed.

St. Peter's runs a number of voluntary groups including flowers, church cleaners, welcomers, deputy church wardens, readers and refreshments to enable the church to continue delivering its ministry and mission agenda.

St Peter's celebrates all major Festivals, holds a Remembrance Service and a Memorial Service every year, and occasional services e.g. a Pet Service.

Mission Action Plan

Currently St. Peter's is without a Mission Action Plan. The PCC is looking for the new vicar to work with them to develop a Mission Action Plan that will help guide the church through its next chapter.



The Vicarage

The vicarage is a new build set in the heart of the rapidly expanding community of Chellaston. The vicarage is a new build set in the heart of the rapidly expanding community of Chellaston. Plot 554, 'The Tuscany', is a 4 bedroom modern home excellently suited to families. It has an open plan kitchen with integrated kitchen appliances, dining area with french doors to rear garden, utility, study, cloakroom and front facing living room. It has a family bathroom and an ensuite to one of the bedrooms. It has solar panels fitted contributing to low running costs due to its energy efficiency.

The Church Hall

The Church Hall is to the south of the church. It has a large main room that includes a stage area, smaller room immediately adjacent to the main room, fully equipped kitchen with serving hatches to the main and adjacent rooms. There is also a choir room, youth room and accessible toilet in the building. The Parish Office is also situated within the Church Hall, and has a rear door to provide private access to the office.



St Peters Chellaston benefits from a very supportive congregation and regular income from the hire of the church hall, which have contributed to it being able to support its expenditure. The Church and Hall finances are controlled by two volunteer treasurers; the accounts are kept separate and this enables the income from the hall to be clearly reported and managed.

The Church finances, like so many others, were significantly impacted by the Pandemic. We joined the Parish Giving Scheme in 2020 to help maintain donations whilst services were held on Zoom and this has developed over the past 3 years. We recognise that increasing our congregational planned giving and community giving will be vital to ensure our future financial security. We have also taken the opportunity to publicise online giving methods via A Church near You and QR codes linking to our Give A Little page throughout the church. We have recently installed a card machine in church. Thanks to the well managed finances of the Church Hall, it was possible to transfer money from its reserves and support the Church in making 100% contribution to the Parish Share in 2020 and 50% contribution in 2021 and 2022. We returned to paying the full contribution (£45,165) in August 2023. Planned Giving is returning to pre Pandemic levels but this has only ever contributed around 55% of the Parish Share.

The Church Treasurer has also introduced Quickbooks which enables us to provide accounting information more readily. The Church and Hall accounts are audited by an independent accountant. The Hall employs a part time Caretaker and the Hall Treasurer manages this payroll.

The Church holds Legacy reserves of £39,520 and £3,340 (Ted Willows) restricted for repairs/maintenance on the Church Bells. Fund raising events have been more limited in the past three years but the annual Summer Fair/Patronal Festival usually raises sufficient funds to pay our annual Ecclesiastical Insurance.

Some legacy monies as well as a Grant were used to pay for the Screens into Church project, providing four screens and associated computer technology. Sunday Church services are now routinely streamed to the internet, the screens display what is happening in church in areas with poor sightlines, as well as showing any text needed by the congregation during the service and during songs or hymns. Roof repairs to the church were completed in 2024. Consideration was given to an extension to the Church to provide toilet facilities; the Toilet Project was initiated in 2019 but has been put on hold given the pandemic. It is a scheme we would very much like to progress but recognise that a wider review of Church facilities and what should be prioritized should be considered.

The Church Hall has been used regularly in the past 20 years by a local Pre-School Group, securing a regular income alongside hires for local community groups and private events. The Pre-School closed in July 2022, due to reducing numbers and the challenges of meeting the government provision of hours/charges. New regular and occasional hirers continue to be booked and improvements made to the hall including a new cooker and installation of Wi-Fi.
