Many schemes such as those which pass on 'white goods' and furniture, are alleviating poverty by re-distributing surplus! Some of them mend and restore donated goods providing skills and jobs.

Recycling

Follow your local Council guidance for kerbside collections by separating items and avoiding contamination e.g. rinse out plastic containers.

Retailers have an obligation to take-back an electrical product you are replacing like-for-like - Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE) directive – the aim is to recycle 85% of this waste by 2016.

Be aware of hazardous items e.g. Low energy lighting Compact Fluorescent Light bulbs (CFL) have mercury in them. These should be disposed of to local Council waste facility or other depots not put in the 'black bin'. www.recolight.co.uk/Consumers/FREE-Light-Bulb-Collection Most supermarkets take used batteries.

In all purchasing, choose products with low environmental impact, e.g. cleaning materials www.which.co.uk and search for "natural cleaning products

Look for wood, stationery products and furniture with the UK or global forest stewardship mark.





Avoid single-use, disposable products such as polystyrene cups and plates.

Use recycled materials whenever possible e.g. from Reclamation yards
